When Tillamook school convenes next Fall, there will be a strong corps of teachers to cope with the work. Prof. E. H. Whitney has been re-employed as principal, and of the old faculty Mrs. E. R. Hays and Miss Eva Kays are the only teachers who have been retained. The new teachers will be Miss M. Bradley, graduate of the U. of O.; Miss Stella J. Crawford, graduate of the Willamette University; Miss Minnie Roffland, graduate from the high school at Republican City, Neb.; and Miss Wallace, graduate of the Illinois state normal.

Hon. B. L. Eddy of Tillamook has been campaigning the past week and has spoken at Gaston, Glencoe, Cornelius, Gales Creek and elsewhere. Although it has been a busy time among farmers and they have not been able to attend in as large numbers as they would at some other season, yet the effect has been good and it is believed the people have been aroused to the necessity of turning out at the election next Monday. Mr. Eddy has shown that he is one of the most eloquent and instructive speakers in the state and as he is a young man the people will no doubt have an opportunity to meet him again when he is himself called to some higher place.—Forest Grove Times.

On account of the severe colds of many of the grade pupils, it has been necessary to abandon the entertainment that was intended to be given this evening. It is a great disappointment to both teachers and pupils, but the inevitable must be accepted. The eighth grade graduation exercises will be given in the opera house on Friday evening, to which everybody is invited to be present. The program will include: Song, class; class address, Herbert Parsons; violin duets, Chester McGhee and Frank Maps; recitations, William Foster, Gertrude Briscoe and Ida Goyn; vocal solos, Hazel McNair and Edna Alderman; farewell song, by class. Mr. B. L. Eddy, chairman of the board of directors, will present the diplomas to the class.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, with Mayor Tallmage and Councilmen E. Jenkins, F. L. Sappington, W. H. Cary and A. E. Imbler present. The bills allowed were: Tillamook Lumber Co., lights \$19, lumber \$22.54; water rent, \$30; G. W. Grayson, \$1; recorder's salary, \$15; R. L. Wade, \$3.45; Eli Olds, \$27.50; marshal's salary, \$45; Elmer Baker, \$3. A petition from the second ward asked the council to appoint C. H. Woolfe councilman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Councilman Grayson, and upon motion this was agreed to. An ordinance was introduced granting John E. Tuttle a franchise to erect and maintain a telephone and telegraph system in the city, which was laid over. Councilman Imbler handed in his resignation, which was accepted.

The Debating Contest.

The debating contest on Friday evening between the pupils of the Tillamook high school drew a large crowd at the opera house, and it proved another profitable and enjoyable evening. Editorial Snap Shots.

It looked a little bit strange that the biggest shouters for Hermann before the county convention were the hardest to get to the polls on Monday.

It was a pleasantly contested election in Tillamook with no political sores to heal up after it is over or political grudges stored up for use at some future time.

Has George Brownell made Clackamas county as slippery as he is himself politically? One would naturally think so by the way it slipped from the republican to the democratic column on Monday.

School district No. 26 is in this predicament: It has one pupil in the district, \$585 on hand, not enough legal voters to petition to consolidate with some other district, and lacks the necessary six children in the district which the law calls for before it can open school.

The only discordant note in the recent election came from the Independent, in its effort to besmirch Representative B. L. Eddy, also Messrs. H. T. Botts, A. W. Severance and Henry Alderman, who formed the delegation from Tillamook to the congressional convention, and last, but not least, because the editor of this newspaper happened to be appointed the congressional committeeman.

Let's see. Freight is being carried to Grays Harbor from San Francisco for \$1 a ton, the steamers passing Tillamook on their way. With the bar improved it is safe to predict this will become a port of call for the Coast trading steamers. Did it ever occur to the people of this county when the bar is improved the yoke of excessive freight rates will be lifted from their shoulders?

The vote in Washington county was an agreeable surprise. It is well to note that Mr. B. L. Eddy did some good work in that county at a time when the democrats had the bull by the horns and the republicans had conceded that they stood not a ghost of a show. With his own county giving Mr. Hermann a plurality of 350 votes and Washington 387, the gentleman from Tillamook played an important part in electing the gentleman whom the Tillamook delegation succeeded in getting the nomination.

Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey came to Tillamook last week, at the solicitation of some of the cheese manufacturers, on account of dairymen doctoring their milk. He took some samples of the doctored milk to Portland to have it analyzed, when it will be ascertained how and in what way this is done, which will subject those who have done so to prosecution. We have been informed that as a few dairymen persist in doctoring their milk, while others skim and water it before they take it to the factory, it has been decided by some of the manufacturers to report all such cases to the dairy and food commissioner. It is the intention of Mr. Bailey to hold a dairyman's institute in Tillamook this fall.

There were 476 sensible people in Tillamook on Monday, who voted for the interest of this county, a number of whom put their party prejudices aside and voted for the party which is going to give Tillamook harbor improvements, and consequently a great boost. The HEADLIGHT doffs its hat to these 476 loyal Tillamookers, and we can assure them when congress grants an appropriation for the improvement of Tillamook bar they will look back with pride to their vote last Monday. But to the other fellows, those who were indifferent, stayed at home or voted for a candidate who couldn't do Tillamook one particle of good, we must say, gentlemen, the next time you vote we hope it will be for, not against, the best interests of the county and its industrial growth and development.

The politicians about concede that the HEADLIGHT is a strong factor in politics in Tillamook county. True, but we hope they won't go saying that it is "Pull Devil, pull Baker," politics. One good democrat, who has figured a long time in politics, said on Tuesday, when he heard the vote in this county for Hermann and the surprisingly small vote for Reames, "The darn'd fools of democrats have voted the republican ticket." That is wrong, sir. They had been reading and taking the advice of the HEADLIGHT. That is where the trouble originated, but we are inclined to think that neither set of voters are to be dubbed "darn'd fools," it wasn't those who voted the republican ticket, for they had taken the sound advice of the HEADLIGHT in voting for the interests of Tillamook county and their own benefit.

The Nehalem Transportation Company has offered to tow schooners for the Truckee Lumber Company for 50c. a thousand and the Tillamook Lumber Co. for 60c. This is to bring the schooners into the bay and tow them out from there. The latter company will have to bring the schooners up to this city and

take them down, which will make the towing from Tillamook City amount to 75c. a thousand for lumber shipped from this city. As we have repeatedly stated, the want of a tug service has been a detriment to the lumber industry in this city and something should be done to multiply these industries and a weekly pay roll. True it is there is very little towing at present and it is expensive to keep a tug boat in service, so it is a question whether the saw mills have to precede the tug service or the tug service the saw mills. Under the circumstances, when saw mills are dependent upon a tug service for expect business and the tug upon the saw mills for patronage, it seems to us that a basis should be arrived at without very much trouble. It does not look right to discriminate against Tillamook City in favor of Hobsonville, or to make rates so high that it almost prohibitory for anyone to figure on the export trade. Fifty cents a thousand is a big tax on lumber for towing and is as much as it will stand, if all are to make a fair profit, so it is to the interest of this city, and we believe it will be to the interest of the Nehalem Transportation Co. as well, to bring schooners to this city for 50c. a thousand. The tug Geo. R. Vosburg towed the barge C. H. Wheeler to this city without any difficulty. We still hold tenaciously to the opinion that it would be the best thing that could happen for Tillamook City if the business men had an interest in a tug boat, for then there would be some assurance to the mills that they could get their lumber to market at a fair and reasonable rate for towing. It is probable that the Nehalem Transportation Co. will do this and meet the requirements of the ports.

Tillamook county showed its loyalty to Binger Hermann because it thought he was the right person to look after Tillamook's interests and pressing needs. It is now up to Binger Hermann, and to Senators Mitchell and Fulton as well for the exalted position they now hold and brought about by the loyalty to them of this county's representative, to show their loyalty to Tillamook by using their combined effort to have our oft repeated prayer for Tillamook bar improvement granted in the next river and harbor bill that is to be introduced next December. The political fights in Tillamook county the past few years have been hotly contested affairs and the cause of factional strife, but the leaders of the predominant faction of the republican party went into the fight with preconceived ideas, and to their credit they have won out every time. They saw they must have men in congress who were pledged to Tillamook bar improvements. B. L. Eddy was sent to the state legislature twice with this object in view. It was his influence and

support that lifted Mitchell out of an embarrassing fight and sent him to the senate, and it was Mr. Eddy's unswerving support in a long drawn out fight which conferred the same honor upon Fulton. It was the same faction which controlled in the recent local convention, and it was the delegation from Tillamook that went to Hermann's support when he was whipped and out of the fight, which practically gave Hermann the nomination and rallied to his support last Monday. Thus it will be seen that the predominant faction of the republican party in this county has worked along lines which are for the benefit of Tillamook, and they have succeeded and brought the matter of harbor improvements to a focus and where the two senators and congressmen cannot go back on their promises. And this ought to convince every republican that those who have brought about these flattering results did so, not for their own personal aggrandizement, but for the county's benefit. They resorted to the proper political methods in solving harbor improvements, and now that Tillamook county is in a position where it must be recognized when it asks for an appropriation, it is plain that the political fights in this county were of a character that were far reaching and brought about the desired and preconceived object, and thanks to those who stood the heat and brunt of the factional fight and won out. An era of progressive growth is in store for Tillamook when Mitchell, Fulton and Hermann goes back to Washington and does the right thing by their friends in Tillamook, who stood by them loyally when they needed true and staunch friends.
