

BINGER HERMANN IS ELECTED.

Tillamook County Gave Him 350 Plurality and "Didn't do a Thing" to Reames.

The election on Monday passed off quietly, with comparatively very little bustle. The stay-at-home voters were larger than were expected, for only 701 voters went to the polls, giving Binger Hermann, republican, 476 votes; A. E. Reames, democrat, 126; J. W. Ingle, socialist, 60; W. P. Elmore, prohibition, 48. This gave Hermann a plurality of 350 votes in Tillamook county. To every four votes cast for the republican candidate, the democrats only polled one. Beaver again holds the honor of being the prohibition precinct, sticking to the "water cure" to relieve the county of its bottled-up condition. Sandlake has developed into a democratic hotbed and is the precinct that carries the unturfed broom with small comfort for switching to the democratic hard times column. Twelve socialist votes at Little Nestucca and ten at Tillamook precincts were the largest votes polls for the socialist, and 60 votes all told is not very encouraging from a socialistic standpoint. Hoquarton, Bay, Tillamook, Garibaldi, South Prairie, Blaine and other precincts "didn't do a thing" to Reames, and had a full vote been cast Hermann's plurality would have been in the neighborhood of 600. The late Thos. H. Tongue's vote in the election last June was 659, which gave him a majority over the democratic candidate of 366 votes, which is very little difference in this election. Timber Land Frauds.

Premotions of an impending sensation in public land matters were visible in Portland on Tuesday in the arrest of Horace G. McKinley, a well known timber land locator. Miss Marie Ware, who was recently forced to resign from the office of United States Commissioner, will be arrested Wednesday. Warrants are out also for the arrest of S. A. D. Pater and John Doe. The identity of "John Doe" could not be ascertained for publication. The charges are those of forgery, perjury and conspiracy to defraud the United States by fictitious and fraudulent entry papers. The specific complaint against McKinley sets forth that he "filed false affidavit papers in the office of the register of the Land Office of the United States at Eugene, in violation of sections 5418 and 5444 of the revised situation of the United States."

The arrest of McKinley signals the beginning of a big shake-up in public land affairs in this state. Citizens and officials of high and low degree and members of the so-called "land ring" are to be brought up with a round turn. It is rumored that the outcome will be highly sensational. Uncle Sam has had his agents investigating land frauds in Oregon for over two years. He now has a special agent here whose duty is to file information immediately with the District Attorney. The presence of this agent is significant, for he is sent out by the Interior Department only on rare occasions.
