The lumber schooner Close, with over 500,000 feet of lumber from the Truckee Lumber Co.'s saw mill, met with an accident on Friday. She was being towed to sea by the tug Geo. R. Vosburg and had on board over 500,000ft. of lumber and was drawing 11ft. of water. After she had crossed over the bar, which had 15ft. of water, the rudder of the schooner broke in two and she had to be towed in again to make repairs. It is a question whether the rudder of the Close struck the bar or whether it was defective. The Vosburg people claim there was plenty of water on the bar, while the captain of the schooner claim the rudder struck the bar. She had to be beached to make repairs and was towed out again on Tuesday night.  
Logging camps on the lower Columbia and its tributaries representing a daily output of over 1,000,000 feet will be closed down in a few days, on account of the cut in the price of logs. The owners and agents of the camps and interests affected met in the office of the Benson Logging Company, and decided that the step was necessary. Ten logging concerns representing a total capital of more than \$1,000,000 were represented at the meeting. The camps which will be affected by the decisions of the owners lie along the Columbia and up the Lewis, Coweman and Cowlitz rivers. The approach of the Spring freshets has, as usual, induced the millmen to lay in a good supply of logs to tide them over the weeks when the swollen streams will not allow the customary quantity of logs to be driven down them. A great quantity of logs has, therefore, been dumped upon the market, and the price has fallen several degrees. To force the millowners to pay the usual price for logs, the loggers have now decided to shut down for a time.
