

Must Record Births and Deaths.

It is not generally known that a law was passed at the last state legislature to establish state and county boards of health, and that it is the duty of physicians midwives, nurses or heads of families to report births and deaths to the county physician.

Section 8.—In each and every county of the state the county judge and county physician shall constitute a county board of health for said county, and the county physician shall be health officer of that county.

Section 9.—Every county board of health shall have the power to quarantine against any other county, or counties, or adjoining state, wherein any infectious disease or diseases exist, if, in its judgment, it is deemed necessary; and shall also have power to quarantine any case, or cases, of infectious disease within the county, and shall have authority to call upon all police officers, sheriffs, constables, and all county officers to enforce such quarantine, subject to the authority of the state health officer.

Section 10.—In cities, districts, and places having no local boards of health, or in case the sanitary laws or regulations in places where boards of health or health officers exist should be inoperative, the State Board of Health shall have power and authority to order nuisances, or the cause of any special disease or mortality, to be abated and removed.

Section 11.—It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife, or head of a family, under whose charge any birth occurs, to report the same to the county or city health officer (as the case may be), before the last day of the month in which said birth occurs.

Section 12.—It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife, or head of a family, under whose charge any death occurs, to report the same to the county or city health officer, within forty-eight hours, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

Section 13.—It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife, or head of a family, under whose charge any infectious or epidemic disease occurs, must report the same to the city or county health officer immediately.

Section 14.—It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife, or head of a family, under whose charge any person dies, to report the same to the county or city health officer, within forty-eight hours, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

Section 15.—It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife, or head of a family, under whose charge any person dies, to report the same to the county or city health officer, within forty-eight hours, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

Seventh, Warren goes out on a hor grounder to Stillwell. Long strikes out, Pike walks, takes second and third, scores on Pettis safe to right. Pettis gains third on a wild throw to first, and scores on Vaughn's safe hit.

Hannankrat connects, but only for a grounder, which is gathered in by Still well leaving Vaughn in the cold.

Parsons and Lamb do not reach first and Hiner's fly to right is gathered in by Pettis and Bay City is still one ahead. Stanley nabbs Provost's fly to center. Warren strikes out. Campbell gets a safe hit and W. Provost sends out a hot one to Hiner, who beats him to first with it. Campbell's run not counting.

Eighth, Nodine walks and reaches third on McGowan's safe hit into the right pasture. Stillwell then connects for a three bagger, way back in left, driving in two runs and placing Tillamook in the lead. This great opening is followed by three outs, two strike out, and one at first and Stillwell left to mourn at third.

Ninth, Long connects with a grounder, but it is gathered in by Stillwell. Pike follows with one to pitcher, who assists Stillwell to his scalp, and Pettis puts the grounder to Stillwell, who side fails to score. Leaving Tillamook one to go on, with an inning left.

Considering it was the first game of the season the score is well within the limits of good ball and insures the fans of some interesting sport for the rest of the summer.

For the Bay City nine, the two Provost and Warren played with their usual good form. Pike showed his qualities in base running. The support to the battery was much better than that put up by the locals, and the visitors would have certainly won the game but for the numerous grounders gathered in by the local first base.

Whip is a Good Remedy.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—The absence from the California state laws of the old blue law provision for a whipping post in order that those who transgressed the rules of propriety and decency might be publicly chastised, was deplored this morning by Judge Lawler on the occasion of his being called upon to sentence George Craue for the crime of brutal personal assault upon the aged mother of the prisoner.

"There is a great need for a state whipping post," the judge said. "This man should be treated in the same manner that he treated his infirm and defenseless mother. He ought to feel physical suffering for his inhuman conduct."

"Other states provide a whipping post for the punishment of lesser crimes than this." "I sentence the prisoner to two years in the county jail."

Craue's crime was one of the most brutal in the history of the State of California. For some fancied grievance he whipped his aged mother until she was seriously ill for weeks as a result of his inhuman ferocity.

Victim of Schemers.

B. F. Day, a well-known pioneer of Seattle, was on Saturday made the defendant in a divorce suit brought by his wife. Day is 68 years old and Mrs. Day is 73. They have been married for 44 years. Mr. Day in his answer says that his wife has been induced to bring the suit by persons who have been meddling in an effort to get a part of the property. Day begs the court to set aside the divorce suit, and to enjoin certain persons from visiting his wife and telling her untrue stories that have resulted in the suit.

He says that he has confidence in his wife, but that she is influenced, and in the hands of designing persons she can be made to believe most anything, especially since by her old age her mind is not as strong as it used to be. Day's answer is pathetic. He says that he and his wife lived happily for more than 40 years, and that he wants to die still the husband of the woman he has loved for so long. The well-known B. E. Day, of Seattle, was named for the defendant. At one time he was the wealthiest man in the city, but during the panicky years ago he lost nearly all his property. However, he is still comfortably fixed, and says that it is his only ambition to be allowed to provide for himself and wife during their declining years. If designing persons are kept away from him, Mr. Day says that he and his wife will get along nicely.

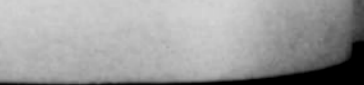
