Graft in an American City.

A committee of the Citizens' union in New York has been collecting material for a history of the large fortunes gathered by Tammany leaders.

The volume will be useful in the municipal campaign about to open. Tammany's majority in New York city last fall was not far from 130,000.

Two of Murphy's former barkeepers have become as wealthy as himself through dock leases. Chairman McMahon of the Tammany executive committee is a millionaire through city contracts awarded during Van Wyck's term.

State Senator Plunkett has made a million through advance tips on purchases for parks and bridge approaches. John T. Carroll, until recently deputy leader of Tammany Hall, is rated at \$1,500,000 cleared in the ice deal which gave Mayor Van Wyck so much trouble.

Carroll has just built for himself a \$700,000 mansion. P. E. Meyer, Croker's former partner, amassed his big fortune through a monopoly of city auctioneering.

In this history of Tammany graft soon to be issued will be many other examples of great wealth gained by Tammany chiefs within a few years. It will be an instructive volume for citizens who neglect political duties or vote carelessly.

Range War is Near.

BAKER CITY, Or., July 20.—A range war appears to be brewing in Grant, Malheur and Harney Counties. No serious trouble is anticipated in this county.

The cattlemen have posted notices in certain localities threatening death to sheepmen, but no hostilities have broken out yet.

Several encounters have actually taken place in remote districts, but no one has been killed unless when encounters result fatally both sides hide the facts.

A sheepman of Idaho who has rented 60,000 acres of land in Malheur and Grant Counties says all is serene in his district, but it is known that he has received threatening letters. The sheepmen are armed and will stand only so much.

Ten Years the Sentence.

ASTORIA, Or., July 20.—Josiah S. Smith, alias John R. Rodgers, and John Lane, alias Charles R. Lane, alias John L. Bock, alias John E. B. Myers, alias John Anderson, were this afternoon sentenced by Judge McBride of the Circuit Court, to serve ten years each in the penitentiary.

They are the men who committed perjury in the case of John L. Bock vs. the City of Astoria.

The suit was to recover \$5000 damages for injuries to Bock's right kneecap, which was alleged to have been broken by falling through a hole in the street in this city.

A verdict of \$2500.50 was obtained on the second trial, but before the judgment was paid the two men were arrested in California, where they live, and charged with perjury. On Saturday night Smith was convicted and an about an hour later Lane pleaded guilty.

Lane was brought into court promptly at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and when questioned said he had no statement to make. In sentencing him the court said in part:

"The crime to which you have confessed is a most grave one. To testify falsely in a court, thereby misleading the court and the jury, is a heinous crime, as it violates the sanctity of our tribunals of justice. You are guilty of this crime in its highest degree, for you have committed perjury for the purpose of gain. It appears also that you have been traveling about the country for years making claims for damages for alleged injuries to your broken leg. I believe the case warrants a heavy punishment and shall inflict the highest penalty allowed by the law; therefore, I sentence you to serve a term of ten years in the penitentiary."

Slays two Murderers.

BUTTE, Mont., July 19.—A Miner special from Red Lodge, Mont., says: A state of lawlessness that beggars description now prevails in northwest Wyoming, as a result of which all law and order seem to have been abolished.

From President L. L. Moffett, of the Montana & Wyoming Telephone company, who is now making a tour of inspection of his company's lines, come the news of a bloody lynching which occurred at Basin, Wyo., just across the Wyoming line, early this morning and of an appeal for help from Sheriff Fenton, of Big Horn County, who has arrested a number of prominent cattlemen near Thermopolis and has appealed to the Governor of Wyoming for assistance of the militia in getting his prisoners to the Basin jail.

The lynching this morning, resulted in the killing of two condemned murderers and also in the shooting of a deputy sheriff, C. E. Pierce, who died instantly. The murderers were Jim Gorman, who killed his brother about a year ago and ran off with his brother's wife, and a prisoner named Walters, a traveling man who killed a widow named Hoover at Thermopolis Hot Springs two years ago as because she refused to marry him.

It was reported to Sheriff Fenton last Wednesday morning that a mob was coming up to Basin along the Big Horn river from Hiattsville and Tensip for the purpose of lynching Gorman and Walters. As a measure of precaution the Sheriff took those two men and a horse thief out of the jail and secreted them in a guilty near town under guard of Deputy Sheriff Felix Alston and C. E. Pierce.

Gorman, who has exceptionally small hands, managed to slip his handcuffs and make his escape. Deputy Pierce fired one shot at the fugitive as he disappeared in the brush, but the bullet went wild. Gorman swam the Big Horn river and made for the mountains. A posse of seven men quickly organized and Gorman was recaptured early yesterday morning on Trapper creek, about 50 miles from Basin.

Pope Leo is Dead.

ROME, July 20.—Pope Leo XIII is dead. The last flicker of life expired at 4 minutes past 4 o'clock this afternoon and the pontiff now lies at rest.

The period of over two weeks that Pope Leo passed in the shadow of death was no less wonderful than his life. His splendid battle against disease was watched the world over with sympathetic admiration, and ended after tremendous effort to conquer the weakness of his aged frame by the marvelous power of his mind. The pleuro-pneumonia with which his holiness had been suffering was scarcely so responsible for his death as that inevitable decay of tissue which ensues upon 93 years of life. The tested steel which had been so often before human ills was bound to break at last.

Tonight the emaciated and lifeless frame which held so brave a spirit lies on the bed in the Vatican, beside which almost all the world has prayed. The red damask coverlet rests lightly over the body, the cardinal's scarlet cape is about the shoulders, while on his head has been placed the papal hood of velvet, bordered with ermine. A white silk handkerchief is bound about his chin, and in the hands that have blessed so many thousands has been placed a crucifix. So Pope Leo will remain until tomorrow, watched by uniformed officers of the Noble Guard and rough-clad Franciscan penitentiaries, around the Sacred College of Cardinals will assemble for the official duty of pronouncing Pope Leo dead. After this sad function has been performed, the body will be taken to the small throne-room adjoining the chamber, where it will be embalmed. The funeral ceremonies will extend over nine days, the body being removed to the Cathedral of St. Peter's where it will lie in state. The ultimate resting place of the dead pontiff will be in the magnificent Basilica of St. John the Lateran.
