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Anecdotes.

Senator Clark, of Montana, is a very unostentatious man. He has a habit of going around the streets down town without much regard to the niceties of his personal appearance. 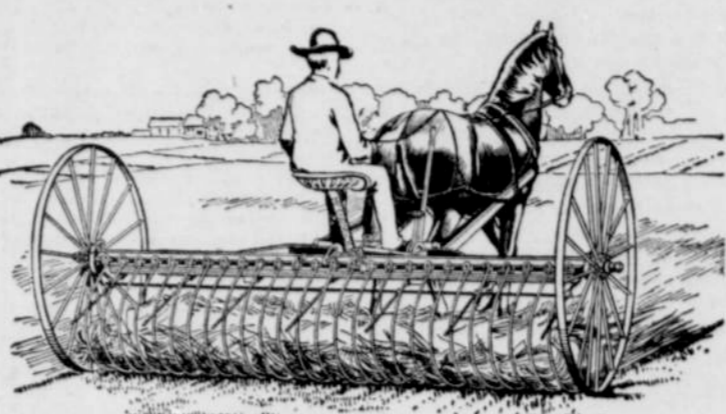
