**Tired of Matrimonial "Jars."**  
 A divorce suit was filed in the circuit court on Tuesday by Mrs. Naomi G. Phelps against her husband, Albert W. Phelps. The parties were married at Hulmeville, Marion County, Oregon, on October 16, 1881. They have resided in Tillamook county for several years. In her complaint Mrs. Phelps claims that her husband treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner, having placed upon her personal indignities which rendered her life burdensome. During the past 12 months the defendant has stated in the hearing of the plaintiff and her children that if it were not that he was afraid of the hereafter he would kill both his wife and himself, and during the same period defendant repeatedly and without any intention of making any legitimate use thereof, began to sharpen his razor in the presence of his wife, at the same time indulging in threatening and menacing looks and gestures, to plaintiff's great anguish and mental suffering. That the children born of the marriage and who are now living are two daughters, Olive and Edna Phelps, aged 19 and 12 years respectively, and Mrs. Phelps asks for the custody of the latter and also asks the court to a-judge plaintiff and defendant shall be henceforth seized in equal shares as tenants in common of certain lands.

At 4 p.m. yesterday the tug Vosburg towed in from the Nehalem a log raft of 630,000 feet. President Wheeler, of the Nehalem Lumber Co., came in with the raft, which was fastened with a tie for which he will receive a patent. The logs are moored at the old Trullinger saw mill and are for saw mills on the river.
