



Big Plant at Cottage Grove.

SPOKANE, Aug. 30 .- A 300 ton quicksilver plant is going up on the Black Butte mines near Cottage Grove, Or., in which G. B. Dennis. of Spokane, is interested. Said Mr. Dennis yesterday :

" Four years of uninterrupted development has exposed the most expansive imbedding of cinnibar ore on the American continent if not in the world. The work represents an expenditure of nearly \$500,000

"The Black Butte quicksilver mines are located in Lane County, Oregon, ome 18 miles from Cottage Grove. During the four years 12,000 feet of work has been done, which includes a vertical shaft to the 1000 foot level. At each 100 foot station a drift running on the foot wall has been driven either side of the shaft the full length of the pay shoot 227 feet, and at each level the ledge has been crosscut for its full width of 80 feet.

" The average of the ore is about 16 in now blocked out more than \$2,000,000 to a 300-ton capacity and the mine equipped with a complete electrical scale.


