Cost of Water System.

W. B. Chase, of the Portland Engineer, who has been instructed to furnish an estimate for putting in a new iron water system for Tillamook City, has done the same thing for McMinnville, which includes a wood pipe, his general estimate for that city being:

The wood pipe is not the cheapest kind, but is a redwood pipe with iron couplings. I think the pipe can be had for a little less than estimated, but it is unwise to estimate too low for work on preliminary estimates when no surveys have been made.

The Oregon Pacific Navigation Company was incorporated August 5th, 1903, with a capitalization of \$35,000, divided into 350 shares of the par value of \$100 each, and with officers and directors as follows:

President—Dr. J. K. Locke. Vice President and Manager—F. H. Skinner. Secretary—A. J. Parrington. Directors—A. J. Parrington, F. H. Skinner and Dr. J. K. Locke.

At first meeting of the Board of Directors on the same date, an assessment of 10 per cent of the par value of stock was levied, payable on receipt of this notice.

It was found that the original capitalization of \$35,000.00 would not afford sufficient money to acquire or build suitable vessel and dockage facilities, and at a stockholders meeting held in this city on the 24th ult., an increase of capital stock to \$50,000.00 was voted and authorized. Negotiations are under way towards leasing a vessel for use during time of construction, it having been decided to build at Tillamook, as this can be done cheaper than to acquire by purchase. The offer made by the Pacific Navigation Company for sale of the "Sue H. Elmore" being considered excessively high.
