The Sue H. Elmore had a valuable cargo when she left her on Friday, having on board 35½ tons of chittin bark and 1350 cases of cheese. The bark was worth 17c. a pound, making \$12,070, and the cheese at 12½c. a pound \$10,631.25. She had on board other miscellaneous freight, and took on at Garibaldi 15 tierces of salted salmon for the cold storage at Astoria.

Levi L. Stillwell filed a suit in the circuit court against Sarah J. Stillwell for title to certain property in this city. The complaint alleges that about June 5, 1897, while plaintiff was in a comatose condition, superinduced by acute alcoholism, and unable to transact business, defendant, without the knowledge or consent of plaintiff, took from plaintiff's person a large sum of money, the personal property of plaintiff, and the exact amount whereof is to plaintiff unknown, and with a portion of said money, to wit, \$480, defendant purchased and paid for certain lands in Tillamook City, paying the entire purchase out of said money, and plaintiff prays for a decree determining the trust of defendant in said lands and requiring her to execute a deed thereof to plaintiff.

WHO BLUNDERED?

In Bringing Loggers to Tillamook Instead of Tenderfeet to Locate on Timber Land that was Already Taken.

J. W. Taylor, Isaac Pea, H. D. Taylor and A. J. Burcham, of Kelso, Wash., and Fred N. Stallcop, of Kerns, Wash., found themselves a badly fooled lot of men after they had been in Tillamook a few hours on Saturday. They were brought to this city by a man by the name of A. M. Mauritzer, of Portland, who had an understanding with C. Ben Riesland that he could locate them on timber claims with between seven and eight million feet of timber. They were to be located for \$100 and they were ready with this, but refused to place it in the bank before being taken out to claims. The men were told there was plenty of vacant land in townships 1 and 2, range 7 west, and Riesland gave the men the impression that his cruisers were out in the woods and he had sent a rig to have two of them brought in. There is no vacant land whatever in these townships. The men began to catch on. One of them said we shall have to go back then, when told where the vacant land was situated. "No, it's over on the cape," they were told. The men were experienced loggers and could not be fooled in that way where the land was situated. Evidently someone had blundered in bringing in a lot of loggers instead of tenderfeet in a scheme to locate them on land already taken. Finding this could not be worked on that class of men, an effort was made to locate the men on timber land found vacant and cruised by Bailey and Weiss. Riesland sent a note to Weiss to come and see him at once, and he did so. Bailey was out of the city, but after supper had a conference in Riesland's office and refused point blank to have anything to do with Riesland's schemes. A conference took place in the Larsen house between some of the men and G. W. Shirley, cruiser for Whitely, Stinchfield & Rennick, who showed his own plans to prove there was no vacant land in the townships named. Bailey also proved this. As was expected, some of the men felt ugly with Riesland, and it was a wonder that they did not take the law into their own hands and make it tropical for him, but wiser council prevailed. "I haven't any objection to Riesland locating us if he'll take us out in the woods; we'll see that he is located for good," said one. "If we could only get him outside the city," said another. This was a sample of how the men felt at eleven o'clock at night when they wanted the HEADLIGHT man to tell how they had been deceived. A. M. Mauritzer, who had done the correspondence with Riesland, fearing that his companions would get mad with him for bringing them on such a goose chase, lit out some time during the night on foot on the track road, the stage picking him up the next day. It is thought by some that he was spirited away for fear of divulging the whole thing. He sent a letter back to Riesland by the stage the next day, and there is likely to be trouble yet. The men left the city on Sunday, some going out on the steamer, with a had opinion of Riesland. The men said that 20 or 30 more had made arrangements to come to Tillamook to file on timber claims. We guess they won't now. One of the men said they shut down the logging camp to come to Tillamook, and each of them would be out between \$40 and \$50 on the trip. They were desirous of securing timber claims, had the money to be located and appeared to be men who earned their livelihood by the sweat of their brow and not by deceiving people.

We've heard about hen pecked husbands, but it begins to look, with some pecking at us, that we're an hen pecked editor. We can smile, eat three or four good meals each day, the best the affords, sleep soundly, and then wonder who's the next that is to join the Pecking Brigade.
