Mr. Allen is known in Tillamook, having had temporary charge of the Presbyterian church for several months, previous to his going to college at San Francisco, when Mrs. Allan was the principal of the public school in this city. Mr. Allen is now the assistant to Dr. Hill in Portland.

Our genial friend Samuel Elmore runs a cannery at Garibaldi in the county of Tillamook. Walter Ridehalgh is the manager of the cannery. There is a law on the statute books of Oregon requiring the cannery men to take out a license before they operate a cannery. Mr. Elmore did not do this and the Master Fish Warden sent his deputy down to Tillamook to arrest Walter which he did and brought him to Astoria to get bail. The case will be tried sometime this fall in Tillamook. In the meantime Sam will operate his cannery, the case will be dismissed and the Master Fish Warden will add more laurels to his reign.—Astoria Herald.

Several weeks ago a man named F. H. Skinner came to Astoria for the purpose of negotiating the purchase of the steamer Sue H. Elmore. He stated at the time that it was the intention of the capital represented by him to take the boat off the Astoria-Tillamook run and establish a Portland-Tillamook line. Negotiations were completed for the transfer of the boat, and everything was satisfactory except the cash, which was not forthcoming. Mr. Skinner then left the city, and was next heard from at Coos Bay, where he was reported to be engaged in a similar deal, with greater personal success. The failure of Mr. Skinner to produce the cash was all that saved the Elmore to Astoria.—Astoria News.

Roy Brady and Elmer Lucas were hunting for deer on Tru Creek above Beaver, on Tuesday morning, when a serious accident happened the former. Lucas had a 38 Winchester, and while Brady was but a short distance from him he let his finger slip off the hammer. The gun was charged and the bullet struck Brady above the elbow of the right arm and ranged downward, lodging above the wrist. As the wound began to bleed profusely, a handkerchief was tied above the wound to prevent Brady from bleeding to death. He was taken home to his grand father's, J. D. Brady, when Dr. Bartel was sent for, but it was eight o'clock at night before the bullet was extracted, the accident happened at eleven o'clock in the morning. Brady was brought to the city on Wednesday so as to be near the doctor. It is thought that his arm will be saved.

Quick's residence tomorrow (Friday) and the interment in the Oddfellows' cemetery. The widow and the bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community in the loss of an affectionate husband and a beloved son.
