An Ordinance to approve and adopt the report and survey of the city surveyor. The people of Tillamook City do ordain as follows:-

Section 1. whereas, the City Surveyor of Tillamook City, Oregon, was instructed by the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, held on the 3rd day of August, 1903, to lay out and mark on the ground a street 60 feet wide showing the proper location of 2nd Avenue East from the northern boundary line of Tillamook City, Oregon, to the southern boundary line of said city.

And whereas, the following report of F. L. Sappington, City Surveyor, was filed with the City Recorder upon the 8th day of August, 1903, to-wit:-

To the Hon. Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon.
