The boom of the Tillamook Logging Company broke early on Friday morning, releasing about 500 saw logs on the Tillamook river. A bad loss happened to L. D. Ackley, on the Wilson river on Sunday, which will put him to considerable inconvenience to tide over the winter with his stock. Late Sunday afternoon his barn was discovered on fire and it did not take long to destroy it and the eighty tons of hay that was in it. So fierce was the fire at one time that it was thought that the house would catch, and it was only by exerting themselves and keeping the roof wet that this was prevented. It is not known how the fire originated.

It is reported again that A. B. Hammond has consummated the deal for Kindred Park and will erect a saw mill near the Hotel Flavel in the near future. If the mill is built he will extend the road from Seaside to Tillamook in order to get out the timber. All the timber for the new mill will have to come from below Seaside. If the railroad is extended it will go on the survey made some time ago, which is about four miles east of Elk creek, thence in almost a southerly direction to the Tillamook county line. The mill will be one of the largest in the state, and if built will be completed by the first of next April. This mill would have been built at Tongue Point, but the property owners wanted to become millionaires on the sale of a mill site and the project was abandoned. This means the building of a large town on the west side and an increase to the population of Seaside. It is very probable that the west side, from Hammond to Seaside, will contain a majority of the voters at the next election.—Seaside Sentinel.
Lying in shallow water, opposite the shipyard of Joseph Supple, the steamer Sue H. Elmore, of Astoria, defied all efforts to move her into the channel. After being launched from the ways there Wednesday she went aground. The powerful towboat Oklahama, of the O. R. & N. fleet, was dispatched to the scene Thursday. A line was passed to the Elmore, but though the big steamer tugged and hauled for about an hour, she was unsuccessful in reaching the channel with her tow and the attempt was abandoned. When the Elmore grounded no serious results were anticipated. It was thought that she would be floated and proceed on her way at high tide. At an early hour steam was raised aboard and her nose pointed for the Morrison-street bridge pier. She made good headway, though hitting the bottom in several places, until reaching a point several hundred feet from shore, when her wheel came in contact with a snag and all the blades were broken off. It was deemed useless to haul her up on the cradle again, and the conclusion arrived at was to tow her to Astoria, where she could be beached and the propeller repaired. The Oklahama was able to move her some distance into the river, but other sandbars, almost in the main road, prevented her getting into deep water. The water was pumped out of the Elmore's boilers and all stow lightened necessary to float her at high water Thursday, when she got off and was towed to Astoria.

Circuit Court.

Judge G. H. Burnett convened circuit court on Monday and the business was not concluded until this (Thursday) morning. The two cases which attracted most interest were the libel suit against Fred C. Baker for \$6000 damages brought by R. M. Watson, and that of the case of Henry A. Ely against C. Ben Riesland over a real estate transaction. The criminal cases against Eli O. Mills and Jeff Hembree were thrown out by the district attorney. The cases before the court were:
State of Oregon, plaintiff vs. Arthur Edmunds, defendant. Charge of larceny. Edmunds pleaded guilty and sentence was suspended until next term.
State of Oregon, plaintiff, vs. John Theiler, defendant. Malicious mischief. Defendant pleaded not guilty. The jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. B. L. Eddy was attorney for defendant.
R. D. Peckham, plaintiff, vs. E. H. Cowing, defendant. For confirmation. Sale confirmed. A. W. Severance for plaintiff.
State of Oregon, plaintiff, vs. The Elmore Packing Co., defendant. Charged with packing salmon without a license. Demurrer to information sustained with leave to district attorney to file new information.
Ambrose Arstell, plaintiff, vs. Harrison Booth, defendant. Appeal from justice court. Demurrer to new matter in answer overruled. Motion of plaintiff for judgment on stipulation sustained and judgment entered for plaintiff for \$13.50 with cost.
R. M. Watson, plaintiff, vs. F. C. Baker, defendant. Action for libel. T. B. Hadley and C. W. Talmage for plaintiff; B. L. Eddy for defendant. Defendant claimed \$6000 damages for defamation of character. The jury brought in a verdict of \$20 for plaintiff.

Editorial Snap Shots.

So the much talked of libel case for the sum of \$6,000 for defamation of character resulted in the insignificant sum of \$20. We will leave our readers to make their own comment and draw their own conclusions.
How remarkable, and yet not very remarkable for Tillamook, some of those who are advocating a new water system were enthusiastic advocates of the present water system when it was proposed to put it in.
Tillamook City's Tammany met its Waterloo in the libel suit. But, oh, how anxious and ready the Tiger and the little whelps were to jump onto the HEADLIGHT. Instead of the anticipated jollification, Tammany's Tigers were not in evidence Tuesday making much ado.
A thought flashed across the editor's mind as he listened to the libel suit, what a different scene it would have been had Mr. Eddy sued the Independent, Ocean Wave, Telephone-Register libelers in the last county election and he had them in a court room where they could not hide behind nom de plumes. Wouldn't it have been interesting?
We must congratulate Mr. B. L. Eddy for the able manner in which he defended the editor in the libel suit, and practical-ly won the case for us, his closing argument giving the truth of the whole case. "Well, you beat us, Mr. Baker," said Mr. T. B. Handley after the verdict was rendered, and to that gentleman we can extend our congratulations for the fair manner in which he conducted his side of the case.
They haven't got the HEADLIGHT plant yet—we mean the politicians who have been on the qui vive expecting that the libel suit was going to "do up" the editor in business. Poor fellows, how disappointed they must feel. But, then, in trying to make the editor a political scapegoat it is well to remember that he has a big lot of substantial friends at his back—friends who have stood to him and to them. We not only practically won the libel suit but we defeated a few local politicians who thought they had us on a barrel and could do us up in business. The HEADLIGHT man will be in business in Tillamook a long time to come—long after those who cannot run us or dictate to us, for we have a happy faculty of gritting our teeth and hanging on with the tenacity of a bulldog.
The second number of the Land Agent has reached this office. It is again disappointing, for there is nothing in it that

will benefit Tillamook, with the exception of two short articles by T. B. Handley and Claude Thayer. The two issues of The Land Agent have done Tillamook no good and the money put into them by the business men is disappointing, for some of them think it was good money thrown away. Every city once in a while gets more newspapers thrust upon it than the field demands and the business men care to support, and this city is up against the same thing right now, so it is a case of the survival of the fittest, in which the HEADLIGHT, which has stood by and fought loyally for the interests of Tillamook since 1888, will continue to be the leading newspaper in the county.
In a recent libel suit against the editor of the Grants Pass Observer, Hon. R. D. Hume received a verdict for \$1 damages. This causes the Albany Democrat to remark that the verdict was not very complimentary to the character of the party bringing the suit. The practice of instituting libel suits against publishers in this state is not receiving very great encouragement. Similar proceedings have recently been defeated by the Portland Oregonian and the Salem Journal. It would be a strange condition of affairs if the publishers be prohibited by law from making reasonable criticism of the questionable transactions of individuals. The statutes of Oregon defining libel are already more severe than an impartial discussion of facts in many instances, will permit without involving the publisher in unnecessary and costly litigation.—Oregon City Enterprise.
Tammany is again in power in New York, for the democratic candidate for mayor, despite the fact that all the most influential newspapers and the clergy of the city were lined up against the Tammany candidate. Many are the reasons given for the sudden change of sentiment in New York, republicans trying to explain it away and the democrats feeling jubilant over the victory. We believe, however, that the people of New York have become tired of fusion, hence the victory to the party that stood by party lines. Fusion with either party often accomplishes its object for a time, as it did in New York, but it is plain to see that it has left the republican party in that city in a worse condition. A few years since the populists fused with democrats in some states and counties, and with republicans in other states, with the result that the populist party has gone out of business. So it is now with the fusionist party in New York, it is out of business, and so it is with party leaders when they flop over and try to down the party they have affiliated with. We do not have to go outside of Tillamook to prove the latter. We do not care to what party a person belongs, but this idea of flopping over and prostituting a party has put many a politician in the back ground for not remaining loyal to their party. The republicans in New York City will, no doubt, stick to party lines in future.
