The congestion of freight in Oregon and California continues unrelieved. Long lines of cars remain sidetracked with products long overdue in the East. To aggravate the situation fruit has stacked up on the Southern Pacific in Southern California.

Lumber for the South.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 8.—The Pacific Coast Company, which owns the Pacific Coast Steamship Company and extensive tracts of timber lands in the State of Washington, is preparing to enter the lumber business throughout Southern California on a scale which will revolutionize that important business in this section of the state.

For more than two years the price of building materials here has soared to a degree which would hardly be thought possible, but despite the high prices there has been an almost unprecedented building boom in all the more important towns.

Today I. C. Ford, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Coast Company, announced that his company within 60 days will establish lumber yards in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Diego, Pasadena, Riverside, San Bernardino, Pomona and subsequently at various other points.
