Coroner C. E. Reynolds has received
letters from the mother and brother of
the man, J. C. Wright, who was a pas-

ill-fated vessel, and whose body was
washed ashore near Woods. There is no
longer any doubt as to the man's iden-
tity. He had sent his mother, Mrs. Wm.
Wright, of Rochester, N.Y., a registered
letter with \$50, and the receipt found in
his pocket was the means by which the
remains were identified. He was 27
years of age.

Gamblers Win at the City Caucus.

There was a little more interest taken
in the city caucus on Monday evening
than usual, consequently the saloon and
gambling faction turned out in their full
strength to head off any candidates the
law and order citizens might nominate.
B. L. Eddy was chosen chairman of the
caucus and Thos. Coates the secretary.
The fight was centered on the offices of
mayor and city marshal. C. W. Talmage
was again nominated for mayor, and he
had the support of the saloon and gam-
bling faction. G. B. Alley was also placed
in nomination, and when the votes were
counted it was seen that the gambling
and saloon people were in control of the
caucus by a narrow majority, for the
vote was: Talmage, 67; Alley, 61;
blanks, 3. The former was declared the
nominee of the caucus for mayor. Thos.
Coates was nominated for recorder and
Ralph Ackley for treasurer, both of whom
were nominated by acclamation. For
city marshal Geo. Tone, N. J. Meyers and
Clyde Clements were nominated. On the
first ballot Clements lacked only three
votes necessary to nominate, and in the
second ballot had 17 votes to spare, and
being the choice of the saloon and gam-
bling faction won out easy. The
caucus then divided into five ward cau-
ses for the purpose of nominating five
council men. The entire ticket is as fol-
lows:

The city election takes place next Mon-
day.
