The steamer Sue H. Elmore came in on Wednesday with a number of passengers, including W. J. Eareckson, W. S. Peterson, C. H. Wheeler, C. B. and O. E. Vantress, W. D. Stillwell, B. Turner and wife, H.  Preston Marolf was arrested on Wednesday charged with using a dangerous weapon, and had a hearing before Justice G. B. Alley. It appears that on Tuesday evening L. G. Freeman was driving his family home, and after they had passed the Headlight office they saw Marolf on the corner near the cigar stand, and watching him, claim he threw a large rock which passed over the buggy and bounded on the lumber on the other side of the road. There appeared to be some doubt whether it was Marolf or someone else who threw the rock, so the justice took the case under advisement until Saturday.
 At the regular meeting of the city council on Monday evening the mayor's veto on the electric light ordinance was read, and upon the question being put as to whether the council would pass it over the mayor's veto, Councilmen Munson, Chase and White voting "Yes" and Councilmen Cary and Reynolds voting "No." As it required a two-thirds vote, the mayor's veto was sustained. It will be remembered that, if the ordinance passed, the Tillamook Lumbering Company was to furnish 35 32 candle electric lights for the city for \$25 per month and to light the city hall free of charge, whereas the city is now paying \$27 per month for 27 lights. Mayor Talmage said the matter of furnishing lights for city should be done by contract and not by a franchise, and no matter how many lights the council furnished the city, there will always be a demand for more lights. Several of the council had a spat at one another, during which Councilman Reynolds remarked, "The electric lights were no good, anyway." Then the council took up the matter of street improvements, during which Councilman Reynolds wanted the council to allow \$20 to make a scraper to grade the streets, but Councilman Chase vetoed that on quick time.

The prohibitionist convention was held in this city on Wednesday, which was presided over by Mr. T. H. Govne, with Rev. R. Y. Blalock secretary. The convention discussed the propriety of nominating a county ticket or putting in all the work possible for the passage of the local option measure. It was, however, decided to nominate part of a ticket so as not to deprive them getting on the ticket at another election, when the following nominations were made:
