It was the request of the deceased that her brothers—Dr. James, Robert and Percy Wiley, with I. C. Clough—act as pall bearers. The casket was covered with choice flowers sent by her many friends. In the short session the appropriation will be estimated and appropriated for to cover cost of the buildings, maintenance of crews, &c.

**TILLAMOOK'S FAVORED SON.**

What He Has Done and Why He Should Be Elected.

The republican nominees for circuit judges are George H. Burnett, at present on the bench, and B. L. Eddy, of Tillamook. Mr. Eddy is well known as a lawyer and legislator. He has been practicing law in Tillamook county for the past eight years, where he for some time enjoyed the leading law practice. Before locating in Tillamook he had resided for some years in Portland, where he began the practice of law. He is a native of Washington county, Oregon, and has spent his life on the Pacific coast. He is now in his 39th year, and a hard worker at everything he undertakes. He has always been an enthusiastic republican, and during each campaign for several years he has taken the stump for the ticket. He has been twice elected to the Oregon House of Representatives, and in that body he made a record for hard work and careful attention to the important measures affecting the general welfare. He served first in the session of 1901 and took an active part in all important work of the session, being generally recognized as a leader in the House. Being re-elected to the House in 1902, Mr. Eddy became at the session of 1903 chairman of the committee on judiciary, and again made a record for hard work and careful attention to the business of the committee. His conservatism and energy in this work elicited flattering notices from the press of the state while the legislature was in session. But Mr. Eddy's principal work at the session of 1903 was in the original framing and introduction and passage of what is now known as the "Eddy Corporation Tax Law." In accordance with his usual conservative methods, Mr. Eddy submitted the first draft of this bill to several competent persons of standing, and with their advice and assistance, the bill was finally reduced to the form in which Mr. Eddy introduced it into the legislature. The bill in its origin and substance was the work of Mr. Eddy. It has been pronounced the most popular and successful piece of legislation that Oregon has enacted in many years. Under its operation the corporations of the state are paying into the state treasury over one hundred thousand dollars a year to the relief of the farmers and other owners of tangible property. When it is considered that this law saves every person who pays taxes on real property about one-half of a mill each year on his state tax, its popularity is easily understood.

Mr. Eddy's nomination for circuit judge by the late Republican State Convention came as a surprise to the politicians. This was not because he was unknown to the republicans of the state, for his selection as chairman of the convention itself attested his standing with the party, but the surprise of the politicians was due to the fact that a man from a small coast county with only five votes out of sixty-two in the district convention should have been the favored one against candidates from the larger counties, with more votes. About the time the convention met it was taken for granted that the large counties would form combinations which would leave out the Tillamook candidate entirely. However, if combinations were attempted, they failed, and the nomination came to Mr. Eddy simply because the delegates believed him worthy of the honor.
