

This Fits Tillamook.

This fits Tillamook exactly, which is taken from the Oregonian: "The democratic campaign in Oregon the present year has been marked out on a programme of vituperation and detraction. So far as the party is doing or attempting anything, it is on this basis. Having nothing to offer for itself, or on its own behalf, it attempts to find resources in calumnious assaults on opponents. These are unusually violent and rancorous, and of course therefore without weight; for the common sense of the citizen estimates such overwrought vehemence at what it is worth—which is little, indeed, or just nothing at all. The Democratic party is so discredited by the record it has made during the past ten years that it hasn't now the courage to come before the country with any propositions of its own; so it turns for an expedient to venomous personal attack on individual political opponents, hoping or desiring in this way to turn attention away from its own unhappy history. But the state of the case is unchanged. The contest of this year, as heretofore is between the Republican and the Democratic parties. Mere accusation, however violent, has no force. Men who have borne honorable reputations and whose lives have long been an open book, are not to be written down or talked down by defamatory language employed for the emergencies of a political campaign. The Oregonian is not exhorting electors to "vote the straight ticket," for it knows each will do as he pleases. But it has observed that men, in "scratching" their tickets, are often controlled by the lightest and slightest motives, and under the notion of "voting for the best men," as the phrase goes, may mark off names as good as any they vote for, sometimes even better, and substitute names positively inferior. But the voter himself is the judge of all this, and may not be reprimanded with. Still, if a man wishes his party to win, the rational way is to vote for its candidates and not take the advice of the opposition to vote against this one or that one, upon some trumped-up story—for the opposition would beat them all if it could. On the Republican ticket, as presented at this time, there are no men "better" than others nor worse; nor is it asserted that among the Democratic candidates there are not those who would make good local officials. But it may be asserted that no better officials would be obtained if Republicans should turn down their own candidates, or some of them, and elect Democrats. No one, we think, knows any of these or criminal on either ticket, and if a party is worth standing for, its candidates, reputable and fit, are worth voting for; and to your fitness and repute, you don't go to your political adversaries for opinion and judgment, but employ your own."

A Salvation Army captain blames mothers for most of the troubles of wayward girls. She declared the greatest enemy of society to be the "incompetent" mother, and the greatest need of "real" mothers. That is certainly true, and he is remembered that often times large families are raised by those who know very little about the duties and privileges of real motherhood. Here is a fact. Now what are we going to do with it? Better education—education that will enable children, girls as well as boys, to learn how to do useful things well—is the great need. Such an education leads to better living, greater independence and higher ideas. Too many of our girls are marrying the first thing in the semblance of a man that offers itself.

Schools and colleges are becoming more practical every day. Not so very long ago agricultural colleges, as they are now conducted, were unheard of. More time was devoted to studying theory and less to actual experimenting. This tendency toward making college courses more practical is not limited to agricultural schools, as is shown by the report from Denver to the effect that the School of Mines of the Columbia University of New York has been investigating certain mines at Cripple Creek with the idea of leasing one if possible, the same to be operated by students. It is undoubtedly true that students would learn more about metallurgy and mining in a month with such surroundings than they could in a year by remaining in New York City and studying the subject from text books. It may be found, however, that the course will not be so popular as formerly if each student is sentenced to a certain number of days of hard labor in the mines.

LAND ONE BLOW.

Japanese Cruiser Hit by Russian Torpedo.

LIAG YANG, Saturday, May 14.—The Russian fleet scored its first distinct naval success of the war on May 10 by torpedoing and crippling though not sinking of an armored Japanese cruiser in Talienwan Bay.

The Russian attack was carefully planned May 10, while the Japanese squadron was concentrated outside Dalny devoting its whole attention to Talienwan, and was carried out the same night.

The attacking force was not a regular torpedo-boat, but was only a small naphtha launch in command of a young naval officer, who had with him three jacksies. The launch mounted a small machine gun and carried three torpedoes.

When darkness fell the launch crept out of Pord Arthur, hugging the shore, with no lights aboard and no glow from the engines to betray her presence. It was late when she gained the outer line of the Japanese squadron. Slipping through the torpedo-boat pickets and selecting the nearest warship, a big armored cruiser, she stole towards her and succeeded in exploding against her side a single torpedo.

A deafening roar followed the explosion, which echoed far ashore. Immediately flames enveloped the cruiser, which evidently was badly crippled.

The crew of the cruiser was seen to be fighting the fire, which they at last succeeded in extinguishing. A sister ship took the damaged vessel in tow and disappeared to the southeast.

The launch escaped the hot fire directed against her by the Japanese ships, but being unable to return to Port Arthur or to get into Dalny. Only a few of the higher officers were aware of the plan, the success of which depended upon secrecy.

The achievement raised the spirits of the Russians afloat, and the young naval officer who was the hero of the exploit was feasted and recommended for the Cross of St. George.

The Russians, May 11, apprehending that the presence of a Japanese squadron meant an attempt to capture Dalny, blew up the piers and quietly evacuated this place. Two thousand Japanese have occupied the road to Sanchiipi, again cutting off Port Arthur. A strong force is advancing against Polandien.

A maniac always has a complaint, about something or somebody. Is that any reason that I should be satisfied with the accusation of insanity forever? In the eyes of the law, if a man is discharged "recovered" from an asylum, he is the same as though he had never been committed. My kick is that repentance is not insanity and that I am able to discern and exemplify the difference, and that repentance was what ailed me. There is no prescribed method of how a man shall repent any more than there is of how he shall rave. There are different emotions, laughing, crying, singing, etc. Repentance is a God ordained emotion that the Protestant preacher does not know anything about. From the time Abel offered his sacrifice, every man who has complied with the requirements of God, has had to suffer persecution at the hands of the man who only makes a pretense of worship, and there never was a more heartless man than a Protestant preacher. When was he ever known to go into our prisons and asylums and try to console the condemned sinner. The Catholic clergyman is the only one I have ever seen that took any interest.
