Sparks from the Anvil.

What a bitter pill it must be to vote for hard times candidates.

Reports from other counties continue to reach Tillamook from reliable sources in regard to Mr. B. L. Eddy's candidacy for circuit judge, which are very flattering, for it is said he will have a thousand majority in Marion county.

It is reported that the democrats will sacrifice everything on their ticket with the intention of defeating Geo. B. Lamb for county clerk. A vote for Coates is a vote for Thayer. There is no other construction to put on the political situation.

The editor doesn't want to tell tales out of school now that their wives are in the East, but the two "grass widows" who are no longer under petticoat government, were putting on lots of style on Tuesday driving off in a covered buggy, headed for, well, we'll have to shadow them the next time.

B. L. Eddy will receive a large democratic vote in Tillamook beside the full party vote, but the republican candidate who will receive the most democratic votes will be G. B. Alley, candidate for justice of the peace for the second justice district, for it is safe to say that but few democrats will vote for Sappington, and loyal republicans would not be guilty of doing such a thing.

Do you want Tillamook to go in the democratic column? If so, then vote for C. W. Talmage, the Vambill republican, the Tillamook democrat and one of Claude Thayer's henchmen. Well, the voters have repudiated such a combination before and will do it again. Vote for W. T. West, the republican nominee for joint representative, who is a loyal republican and a good substantial Tillamooker. Mr. West has made the assertion that he is not a political turncoat.

If G. W. Sappington had put in a little more time when he was county judge examining and ascertaining for himself that all county officials accounts were kept straight, all discrepancies would have been discovered and made right at the time, for it is an easy matter to make a mistake once in a while where a large amount of business is done. It is only natural to expect that every business man will once in a while make a discrepancy in his own accounts, so it is with public affairs. But the county saw mill was Sappington's hobby when in office, which he rode to death, hence the neglect in auditing the officials' accounts, which was the duty of the county court to see were kept correct.

The only objection that the opposition has to Mr. G. B. Lamb is that he has been in office six years. They, however, purposely loose sight of the fact that Thos. Coates was deputy clerk four years, city recorder four years, and was appointed deputy assessor by ex County Judge G. W. Sappington, and paid \$4.00 a day for his services. He has also been school clerk for four or five years. Lamb's salary was at the rate of \$250 a year when he first took office. So on the score of holding office Coates has been in office a much longer time than Lamb, and with a salary at times that was altogether too big, especially as other deputies in the court house were only receiving \$50 a month.

Claude Thayer's independent-republican-democratic mouth piece keeps up the racket that the republicans of the county are rotten. Now wasn't it a big bit of political rottenness when those who are now fighting the republican party compromised the taxes which the Tillamook Lumbering Company owed the county when Mr. Thayer was in control of the saw mill? Now, don't get mad, gentle man, if the HEADLIGHT throws out facts, not insinuations, of the rottenness of those who are fighting the republican party, for in taking up the gauntlet so freely thrown at the republican party and at some of our best citizens, if we trend on the horns of some people they must not blame us, for it is about time to show up the people who are making all manner of insinuations for political effect and to vent their personal spleen.

If the editor of the HEADLIGHT had had the naming of a republican ticket he would have started off with re-nominating Homer Mason for clerk. Politicians would have howled at us if we had recommended such a breach of political etiquette, but, nevertheless, there is some logic in the argument of business men, when they have a good competent and honest employee, is to keep them in their service. If that rule works well in private business, why won't it work well in public business? In some places in the East very little change is made in county officers. Although the people have much reason to be proud of the faithful service rendered by Mr. Mason the past six years, they will have just as obliging and competent servant in Geo. B. Lamb, a man who will go into office with no rule or ruin strings attached to him.
