

Rural Delivery Changes.

There is to be a reorganization of the rural free delivery service on July 1st and the officials of the Postoffice department charged with this duty are reported to be busy with the preliminary work.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Evening Post states that with the reorganization of the division headquarters will come a reassignment of men who have heretofore been known as special agents and route inspectors.

Under the act of the last session of congress these employees will be known as rural agents and will work under the direction of the division inspectors.

Rural carriers who cover what is known as a full route will receive an increase of pay, while those who cover shorter routes will not get the maximum salary.

In regard to the carrying of merchandise for hire and acting as agents for anybody, it is said to be the intention of the department to enforce the law rigidly.

Small favors for patrons on the part of carriers will be permitted when requested, but that is all, the policy being to have the carriers strictly confine themselves for the most part to their legitimate duties.

There has been some criticism of the action of congress in this particular, on the ground that the prevailing system has not interfered with the carriers properly performing their duty to the government, but perhaps the result will justify the action of congress.

It is thought that with the assistance of additional rural agents new routes will be established at the rate of 600 a month, which ought within the next two years to meet every demand. The progress of the rural free delivery service has been remarkable and the great benefit which has resulted from it is inestimable.

The contemplated changes are expected to very much improve the service.

Liquor and Labor.

If a laboring man buys \$100.00 worth of boots and shoes, he buys \$20.71 of labor. \$100 worth of furniture.....\$23.77 \$100 worth of hardware.....\$24.17 \$100 worth of clothing.....\$17.42 \$100 worth of cotton goods.....\$16.91 \$100 worth of men's furnishing goods.....\$18.34 \$100 worth of worsted goods.....\$13.55 \$100 worth of woolen goods.....\$12.86

In every \$100 worth of liquors, he buys but \$1.23 of labor.

If eight laboring men spend \$800 for furniture, hardware, clothing, cotton, worsted and woolen goods, and men's furnishing goods, they contribute \$147.43 to labor; and at the same time that they bring valuable supplies to their families, they stimulate business and add to the demand for labor.

If the \$800 is spent in the saloon, only \$9.84 goes for labor; the families are made wretched; and the men themselves are made worse physically, financially and morally; their jobs are imperiled; and they have wasted their money. Liquor is labor's worst enemy.

What Must I Do to Be Saved?

No man is at rest until he answers this question to his entire satisfaction. I asked the minister, he said, I must do everything to be saved. As there are but three things that the mind can conceive of. 1st—The offering of a sacrifice. 2nd—The obedience to the law; and 3rd—Faith in Christ. I asked him about sacrifice, he said that I must place everything upon the altar just as though it was my only hope, my time, money and all. Then I asked him about the law of God, as it is revealed in the Bible, he said I must obey the law in full, that I must not do anything that it forbids, or omit doing anything it commands. Finally I asked him of faith in Christ, to which he replied, that the Bible was full of promises to the believer, that he that believeth on the Son shall never die, though he were dead, yet shall he live again. I told him that he reminded me of going into the court house and paying my taxes with paper money and getting a receipt in full, then paying them in silver money and have another receipt in full, and again paying them in gold for a third receipt. There is not a writer that recognizes the Christian religion, but that believes that Abel complied with all the requirements of God, and he only offered a sacrifice, there was no law to obey, and it was B.C. 4000 years. When the law was established, there was a high priest who offered the sacrifice once a year, so that during that age there was but one thing required, and that was obedience to the law. When Christ came he offered one universal sacrifice for all, and he fulfilled the law, and thereby became the end of the law, so there is but one thing to do, and that is to believe on him. This one thing I do, and that is what I would kindly advise other men to undertake to do.

Did it ever occur to you what makes me so objectionable to the minister? I will tell you. I have a dollar, it is mine because I earned it, the preacher wants that dollar, because he don't earn any

dollars, if he can fool me to place that dollar on the altar, he gets it, he wants me to sacrifice it, to make an offering, my belief in the sacrifice of Christ is worth that dollar to me, for I get to spend it for myself, instead of having to sacrifice it to the preacher. I not only have that dollar, but I have nine other dollars, the law requires me to give a tenth, in this case the preacher gets that dollar just as though I had sacrificed it, but Christ fulfilled the law, so you see that there is no chance for the preacher to euchar me out of it on a pretense of law.

The Protestant preacher can talk about a burning desire to save souls, but so long as he places any value on religious rites and ceremonies such as holding up your hand if you want to be saved, or signing the temperance pledge, or abstaining from dancing, &c., instead of pointing to Christ on the cross as the only thing that has to do with salvation or of affecting the hearts and lives of men, he will be a failure in the world, and an elephant on the hands of those who have to support him.
