

A DANGEROUS MAN.

Father Schell Maligns Archbishop Christie in a Scandalous, Lying Manner.

Father Jos. Schell is one of the few priests who have entered into a conspiracy to malign Archbishop Alex. Christie, a man who is eminently fitted for the high position he holds and who is, we have every reason to believe, beloved by his people.

"Archbishop Christie has destroyed priests and sisters, has ruined souls and religion, has prostituted his power and dignity in favor of worldly politicians. He has banished from Oregon the priests who have built up Oregon; he has brought with him more than 28 runaway immoral priests, and with them he operates in Oregon. He has deceived your excellency and Rome as well. There are today more runaway or tramp priests in Oregon than are ordained for Oregon.

The above is something like Schell's vindictive and lying style of writing, for while in Tillamook he was frequently engaged in the same thing. He maligned and published false and scandalous letters about B. L. Eddy, Claude Thayer and others, which he is now doing about Archbishop Christie and is endeavoring to work the same kind of "blackmail graft" that he worked while in Tillamook.

One word in behalf of Archbishop Christie. We do not believe one word of the allegations that have been hurled against him, and now that it has been made public that Schell is one of the arch conspirators, we think it only right that the Press of the state should commend the archbishop for banishing from Oregon the priests who were disgracing the Catholic church and the sacred office of priesthood. We have met the archbishop but once, and at his request, and the favorable impressions we gained of him then we still hold. In closing, we can only draw this contrast: Archbishop Christie's thorough earnestness, broad-mindedness and the true manliness with which he fills the office to which he has been called to Father Schell's treachery, vindictive spirit any living tongue.

One of the things which Father Schell accuses Archbishop Christie of doing is that he "has prostituted his power and dignity in favor of worldly politicians." Will Father Schell recall the time when he met, by agreement, certain persons in the back room of a saloon and gambling joint and accepted a money bribe to control the Catholic vote in the interest of certain politicians. This is a fact, and took place in Tillamook City. Some men are too ready to accuse innocent persons of doing what they are guilty of, and in this particular Schell has proved that he prostituted the priesthood, "his power and dignity in favor of worldly politicians" when working a political "graft."

There are plenty of incidents, such as the bogus \$100 bill that he tried to pass, that could be mentioned, but we will desist, for we should only be wasting good space on a bad man like Schell.

HIGH ON SANDS.

Schooner Zampa Ashore on North Beach

NAHCOTTA, Wash., July 17.—The three masted schooner Zampa, bound from San Pedro to Portland in ballast, went ashore at Leadbetter Point at 1 o'clock this morning. Since the flood tide, which carried the vessel upon the beach has receded, she is 300 feet from the water and will be a total loss. No lives were lost.

So light was the vessel that she was not broken up by the heavy breakers and was stranded upon the beach in such a way that Captain Kallenberg, his wife and nine men were rescued without difficulty. Not a soul on board was even injured in the wreck. Leadbetter Point is nine miles from Ocean Park.

During the gale of yesterday, in which the southwest wind blew 60 miles an hour, the Zampa, riding light, was fiercely beaten about. In the heavy swells, her rudder became unshaped, and after that Captain Kallenberg could do little with the schooner but allow her to drift with the wind.

WATER ALL READY.

Available for Reclamation of 50,000 Acres. BEND, Or., July 9.—About 30,000 acres of arid land have been sold by the irrigation companies operating in this vicinity, and more than that amount will be put under cultivation in the Deschutes irrigation region in time for seeding this fall or next spring. Construction work is progressing steadily on the canals and ditches, and water is now available for the reclamation of about 50,000 acres of arid land.

The State Land Board this week approved the application of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company for a contract for the reclamation of 87,000 acres of land in addition to the 140,000 in their present segregations, and the papers are now on file in the Government Land Office at The Dalles. There is no doubt that the Federal Land Department will approve this application, for the land is the same in character as that which has already been set aside for reclamation under the terms of the Carey act. This 87,000 acres of land will be irrigated with water from the Deschutes River, ten miles above the present diversion.

Experience thus far seems to dispel whatever fear there may have been concerning the practicability of irrigation in the Bend country. As irrigation work in this region has been conducted upon a very small scale heretofore, there was some uncertainty as to how the water would act when turned into large canals in this light, ashy soil. Many were afraid that it would soak away rapidly or find underground channels and be lost. These fears prove to have been unfounded, for the Three Sisters Irrigation Company has had water running into its ditches for more than two months and no trouble has been encountered. Water has been running in Deschutes Company's ditches for more than a month and no serious difficulty has been met. This feature of the irrigation problem in the Bend country is therefore taken as settled satisfactorily.

William Ford, who was drowned in the Umpqua a few days ago in company with a young girl of 16, with whom he was attempting to elope, was the faithless husband of a good wife and the father of four children under 6 years of age. There is neither pity for the fate nor excuse for the infatuation of this faithless husband and recreant father. For the young girl whom he enticed into ways of sin there is sympathy only because of her extreme youth and through the possibility that the man, much older in years, and in the wiles of passion, exercised an influence over her inexplicable except on the theory of hypnotic power. Since he was the crafty and weak fool that he was, and she the victim of his baseness that she was, suicide by drowning together may be considered a fitting end to their lives. The pity of the pitiful goes out to the helpless, wronged deserted family of the man, while legitimate sympathy is the due to the parents of the girl—not because she died, but because she was led into disgrace for which death is the only refuge.—Oregonian.

Political Gossip.

The Democratic platform on the subject of plutocracy is illustrated by a vice presidential candidate with \$40,000,000 and over 80 years old. Perhaps he is expected to leave his money to the party.

The Republic says that when the time arrived to speak Parker's "message" came like a 13-inch projectile, the impact of which startled the world into the realization that here was a man. Yes, a man who was silent until he obtained the nomination. By the way, was the 13-inch ammunition chosen for luck?

In nominating Parker for President Mr. Littleton said: "If you ask me why he has been silent I answer because he has not attempted to be the master of his party, but is content to be its servant." Within the next twenty-four hours Parker played the party dictator, but not until he had obtained the nomination.

With the echoes of the Parker telegram still ringing in their ears, Democratic leaders are undertaking to demonstrate the case with which the "second Cleveland" is going to sweep the country this fall. The bold stand of their candidate on the money question encourages them to believe that he will carry New York, and with New York, what are termed Cleveland states—New Jersey, Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland and West Virginia. Of course, they count on the solid South, and add to their list at least one of the three big doubtful states of the Middle West, Indiana, Illinois or Wisconsin. This sounds very well, and if it could be carried out, would pave the way to the White House. But the Democratic mathematicians are over-confident; they claim that which they do not have, and much that they will not get.

The reputation of the Parker ticket and party by the Chicago Chronicle is only one of the manifestations of the coming collapse for the unfortunate old Democracy. "A timid Eastern Democrat," says the Chicago paper, "who fondly imagined that he could be nominated as an unknown, has been placed on the ticket with an octogenarian free silverite from West Virginia, and supplied with a platform which amounts to an endorsement of the platforms of Chicago and Kansas City." "Disagreeing fundamentally with this leader and this party," it adds, "in most things, and agreeing with the Republican party in the essentials of its creed, the Chronicle to-day takes leave of the Democratic party, and allies itself with the Republicans." Though a life-long Democrat, the Chronicle says that "as at present constitute and led, the Democratic party is a menace to the peace, the prosperity and the integrity of the United States and its people." This will be the opinion of a very large element of the Democracy in the middle West and the East.

Attorney-General Crawford holds in an opinion rendered that applicants for second and third-grade teachers' certificates are not entitled to have credit for standing secured by them in any branch if they fail to pass the examination. The provision that where a teacher has, in two successive examinations, received 90 per cent in one or more branches, the applicant may at the next examination be credited with the standing earned applies only to first-grade certificates.

Sportsmen are eagerly looking forward to the open season for Chinese pheasants, as it is evident that the shooting will be better than ever before. Everyone who has had occasion to go through the farming districts has noticed that the supply of young birds is unusually plentiful. One cannot drive through the wheat lands, in any direction from Forest Grove, without frequently starting up large flocks of the beautiful game birds. As a general thing, a large percentage of the birds are killed each year by the rains soon after they are hatched. This year, however, there was no rain until the young pheasants were strong enough to survive it. For this reason there will be almost twice as many young birds as last year.

At Seattle, Wash., Monday last week Dr. Prantz H. Coe, former member of the School Board and president of the State Medical Society, told his family that his death could not be delayed long. During Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday he presided over the sessions of the Medical Society, and Thursday he gave up his office of president to Dr. Vocum, of Tacoma. Friday night he was hurriedly summoned to the Seattle General Hospital to operate on a patient for appendicitis. As he was leaving the hospital, soon after midnight, the physician and surgeon collapsed. He fell in the hallway unconscious, and was carried to his home in a comatose condition. At 7:30 o'clock he died, less than a week from the time he warned his family that his end was near. Dr. Coe has suffered for some time from Bright's disease.
