SOLD COUNTY WARRANT Belonging to the District and Does not Account for the Interest.

The committee appointed at the annual meeting to audit the accounts of School Clerk Thos. Coates has handed in the following report:
 Tillamook, Oregon,
 July 16th, 1904.
 To the Chairman of the School Board and to the voters of District No. 9:—
 We your committee appointed to examine the books and accounts of the Clerk of said district beg leave to report that we have performed the duties assigned to us, and herewith make the following report as to the financial condition of said district, to-wit:

Of the \$777.06 Sinking Fund, there is at this date \$434.67 invested in county warrants as follows:

 The Clerk admits that all warrants, with the exception of one warrant, which was purchased for the Sinking Fund, prior to January 1st, 1904, had been disposed by him and upon his own motion, claiming it to have been done through an error, and while the face of said warrants have been accounted for, there has been no accounting of the interest which the same had earned, and your committee is unable to determine the amount due the district from the interest on said warrants, not knowing the amount or date of purchase of all of said warrants, being able to locate only one, that in the sum of \$266.67, purchased Nov. 8th, 1902. The object of investing the sinking fund in interest bearing securities, is that the interest of such securities may offset the interest on the district's bonds.

Several months previous to the recent election the editor of the HEADLIGHT was informed by different parties that Thos. Coates, school clerk of district No. 9, had cashed, without the authority of the school directors, a county warrant which belonged to the sinking fund of that district, of which Coates was the custodian. This warrant was for \$266.67 and was not called in by the county treasurer, but it was disposed of to private parties, and when Coates cashed it he was paid, if we remember right, about \$15 interest that was then due on the warrant. By way of parenthesis we may state that when the district decided to create a sinking fund a few years ago, the directors instructed Coates to invest these funds in county warrants so that the money could be earning interest. Having bought county warrants with these funds they became the property of the district, so Coates had no right whatever to sell one of these warrants and pocket the interest without the consent of the board any more than he had to dispose of other school property belonging to the district.
 But to substantiate these facts, we were content to wait until Coates made

his report and a committee checked up his accounts and filed its report before we would publish one word in regard to what had been told us.
 We found, on making inquiries, that some of the directors had been apprised of what Coates was doing, although not officially, of course. They were disposed to be as charitable and lenient with Coates as possible, thinking that he would be able to straighten the matter out by the time he made out his annual report. For that reason the board did not think it advisable to make the matter public. Neither did the HEADLIGHT wish to be uncharitable with Coates, as we understood he was in financial straits, so we, too, under the circumstances purposely refrained from making public mention of it, for it is not our nature to jump onto a man when down and in a tight place. Neither did we say one word about it when Coates was running for county clerk, neither did those who were aware of the facts "sneak" on Coates at the annual school meeting. Probably a dozen person or more were attending that meeting who knew what he had done, and although Coates may not be aware of it, there was a disposition to befriend him even by those whom he had antagonized politically, for it was those who were mum. Had he come out in a manly way and explained to the directors that he had temporarily used the money on account of financial troubles, we believe the board would have overlooked it after he had straightened it all out at the end of the fiscal year, and his annual report had shown that he had satisfactorily accounted for all money belonging to the district.
 This he did not do.

Coates' report says nothing about the county warrant he wrongfully cashed, the interest that he drew on it, nor the amount of interest the sinking fund has earned. This was the cause of Coates' troubled expression at the school meeting when a question was asked about the sinking fund and the party was told that the clerk had invested the money in county warrants. It will be seen by the report that all the county warrants that Coates has on hand, with the exception of one for \$37, were bought as late and between Jan. 6 and May 4 of this year. As a matter of fact, Coates has not kept any account of what the sinking fund has earned, and even the committee shows that it was in a fog, for it could not determine the amount Coates owed the district for interest. He had \$525.25 on hand June 14, 1903, as will be seen by the report, and up to the commencement of this year all the money that Coates reports as being invested was \$37.00.

We understand that Coates gives as his reason for cashing the warrant that it became mixed up with other warrants and he cashed it by mistake. We do not think that is true, for when he cashed it no other warrants were sold with it. Another thing, Coates has not accounted for the interest, so that must have become mixed up as well.
 What the directors will do, we do not know. When the county court knew for a positive fact that the late Sheriff Alderman had been monkeying with county funds, it rightly ordered his arrest. The school directors now have the report of the investigation of Coates' accounts, so it is up to them to decide what they will do. Probably it is a good thing for Coates that his error has been detected, for as soon as officials begin to use public money for their own use or for speculation, no matter how good their intentions are to return it, one thing leads on to another until some of them suddenly find they are defaulters, even though they had no intention whatever of defrauding the public. If Alderman's first errors could have been detected and made public, it would have been a good thing for him and the county as well.
 One thing is positive, Coates' usefulness as a public officer is gone, and we see no other alternative for him than to resign his public positions. The committee has

let Coates down as lightly as it possibly could, simply saying that the warrant had been disposed of by Coates and upon his own motion, and the HEADLIGHT will be just as lenient, reserving its criticism of Coates' action until some future time, but with this recommendation to the directors or district, that the school funds be deposited in the bank in the name of the district.

City Council Meeting.

The city council met on Monday evening, those present being the mayor and Councilmen C. E. Reynolds, G. Munson and A. T. White. The bill allowed were:

 The committee on site for a new location for a city hall and fire bell tower, reported that the lot opposite the Presbyterian church could be bought for \$400 from Mr. Beals, so it was decided to purchase it.

Claude Thayer was present in behalf of the Tillamook Water Commission, and asked the city council to employ a competent engineer to prepare plans and specifications for a new water system from Killam creek, with a reservoir on Owens' hill. He said he did not think the commission was willing to expend so much money on that undertaking. He said that the water company would sell its plant for \$7,000. His idea was to buy the company out, spend \$10,000 on a drainage system and \$13,000 on improvements to the water system and in erecting a water tank in the city for fire protection, making in all \$30,000. Mr. Thayer said that a drainage system was needed more than another water system, and that injunction papers were already made out to be served as soon as a move was made to bond the city. The council instructed the recorder to employ a competent engineer to prepare plans and specifications for the proposed system from Killam creek.

The city council voted down the ordinance making peddlers' license \$5 a day and passed a similar ordinance to its second reading.
 A new side walk was ordered put in from Morton & Tromley's corner to the north boundary line. The marshal was instructed to compel Hiner & Lamb to remove the rubbish outside their shop and to ask the Tillamook Lumbering Co. to place a spark screen over the smoke stacks in the saw mill.
