Phelps' boats to the Sea Lion Rocks off Cape Meares lighthouse, to explore the picturesque home of the numerous birds and dangerous trip to make in a small, even in fine weather and when there is not a ripple to be seen on the mighty Pacific. The party included D. B. Reasoner, D. Burkhardt, Wm. Wall and H. Schulerick, of Hillsboro, Or., R. Lockwood, of Forest Grove, and H. M. Reasoner, of Reasoner, Iowa. They had a successful trip out to the rocks, and some of them landed and succeeded in reaching the uppermost part of the rock, where they found a large number of bird's eggs and interesting things. They captured several young birds and killed a number of sea lions, there being thousands in the vicinity of the rocks. On coming back over the bar a little incident occurred which made them hold their breath and proved to them that a person was running considerable risk of going to Davy Jones' locker when taking a trip to the seal rocks in a small boat.
