The prolong dry spell this summer in Tillamook county is one of the longest in the history of the country, and even the oldest settlers cannot remember a year when the gentle patter of the rain in this the wettest part of Oregon has been so long between the refreshing showers.
Commissioner Geo. Loeppel came in from Nehalem Tuesday to attend court. He has become identified with the good roads movement and is president of the Nehalem club, and is also interesting himself with the people of that section in getting a bridge across the north fork of Nehalem river.
Mrs. Mary Squires, widow of the late George Squires, died in this city on Tuesday, aged 66 years. The deceased was an old and respected resident of this city. The remains were buried in Bay View cemetery on Thursday, where her husband was buried a few years ago. Rev. E. M. Patterson, pastor of the Christian Church, conducted the religious service.

Daring Robbers at Netarts.

Two men entered the house of Ed. Morgan on Netarts Bay about four o'clock on Wednesday last unobserved by Mrs. Morgan, who was outside at the time. Hearing a noise inside the house, she thought a number of chicken had entered, and getting up with the intention of driving them out, to her great surprise on turning she saw two men in the house, one standing near the door and the other in the middle of the room, and as both were disguised. She did not wait to argue with the robbers, but immediately took flight and made for the home of her father-in-law, who lives about two miles away. After she had left the robbers went through everything with the expectation of finding money. They succeeded in finding a few silver dollars and a bogus \$20, which they took, but in their hurry they overlooked a genuine \$20. Ed. Morgan was hauling gravel at the time, and the only other person on the place was a small boy. As the Morgans did not call out their neighbors by immediately informing them of what had happened, no effort was made to trail the robbers. It was at first thought that they had taken Morgan's certificate in the A.O.U.W., but this was found later.

Will the city council appoint a person as city marshal who will enforce the law or a person who will allow himself to be owned and run by the gambling ring? The citizens await the action of the city dads to see how many of them are impregnated with the wide open gambling. Before a person is appointed the city dads ought to know whether he is going to enforce the law, for this idea of taking money out of the city treasury to pay peace officers for not doing their duty is a matter which must be settled, and settled right?

For a long time a number of our business men have realized and gone through the experience that a number of businesses in Tillamook City are overdone. The merchants carry larger and better stocks of goods than towns with two to three thousands inhabitants. It is often said that competition is the life of trade. So it is to a certain extent, but when there is only a limited amount of business in a town a multiplication of stores and businesses does not increase the trade. Under those circumstances it is not surprising to find that a number of our business men have taken a tumble to themselves, and with good business and horse sense they have agreed to consolidate. All will agree that there is only room for one meat market, one harness shop and one furniture store in the city, and even with all the trade neither of these stores will have a snap nor a monopoly by any means. We believe the butcher, the saddler and the furniture men will treat the public right and not impose on the people because they have a monopoly on those lines. There are other businesses in the city which might be good horse sense and business sagacity to double up, for it is far better for a city to have a limited number of business men doing a fair amount of business who are satisfied than to have scores of business men who cut down their expenses to the smallest limit and are continually complaining about poor times. For a long time business changes have been look for, and with the prospect of business being somewhat limited this winter, the indications are that the end is not in sight in this doubling-up business. Tillamook City is all right and will continue to be a good business town, but during the past few years an over-production of new businesses have over-done the town in a number of lines.

* * *

The Headlight is accused of fighting the saloons and also with trying to incite a sentiment against them in Tillamook County. That is not correct. All that we have done, as those who have read the Headlight carefully for several years will bear us out in, is that we have made a fight against gambling, a wide open town, and paying peace officers big salaries who privilege gamblers to run gambling houses in open violation of law and order. We have characterized the practice as damnable, an injury to the city and a curse to a number of men and their homes and families. And we plead guilty for endeavoring to create a sentiment against that kind of thing, especially as those who run the gambling joints want to run county and city politics. As to local option, that is a question the people will have to decide for themselves, and if the saloon people have antagonized a large number of people by their persistency in violating the law and fighting some of our best citizens, they have only themselves to thank for being upon against a class of people, although they have no objection to saloons, do object to a system of robbing people at the gambling tables. We do not wish to be considered mock-modest on the anti-saloon question, but we distinctly say this: If local option carries in Tillamook county, then it is up to those who vote for it to see that the law is rigidly enforced to the letter. The Headlight is not in favor of local option if peace officers are allowed to privilege a favored few to break the law as they do in the matter

gambling. Therefore, the Headlight has confined its attacks more especially to gambling, with the idea of getting the public to see its pernicious effect upon the moral and business conditions in Tillamook county and city.

NEHALEM.

He leaves a wife and seven children, all of which are grown.

A regular meeting of the "Good Roads Club" was held at Batterson's hall on Friday evening for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Loer-pabel, W. J. Roehmer was appointed secretary. The following officers were elected: G. Loer-pabel, president; W. J. Roehmer, secretary; and S. Svenson, treasurer. It was decided to call this association "The Nehalem Good Roads Club"; that the Good Roads Club take in road dist. No. 1 of Tillamook County, Oregon; that the same club meet every 3rd Friday of each month, at Batterson's Hall. The chairman appointed Henry Tohl and W. Vedder to arrange matters about getting the hall and to furnish secretary with minute book, etc. After a long discussion about how to build good roads and to build a bridge across the North Fork, every member pledged himself to pay an extra five mill tax for the purpose of building said bridge, and the club authorized the president to request the county court to favor Nehalem this fall with a bridge across the North Fork.

Rough on Gamblers in Portland.

"There will not be any public gambling, never; not so long as I am Sheriff. I ordered all the poker games closed, and told them not to open again."

This statement was made by Sheriff Tom Ward on Monday to an Oregonian reporter, after he had dispatched his chief deputy, G. P. Morden, to visit all saloons and cigar stores where poker games were in operation, and tell the proprietors of the places of business that such games are included in the prohibited class under the statute. Mr. Morden, following the instructions of his chief, went to the saloons of August Erickson, Fred Fritz, Eugene Blazier, J. W. Blazier and the Banquet Hall and Maze saloons, and also a number of cigar stores. Wherever he found a game of poker has been running he ordered it stopped.

"They must close and remain so," said the sheriff, in the most positive manner. "I will never permit public gambling."

Referring to the big nickel in the slot machines, commonly known as the money machines, the Sheriff was equally positive, and said he would confiscate any and break them up if he discovered any in operation.

"Some time ago," he stated, "I was waited upon in relation to these machines. They told me it had been fixed to run them, but I said not with me. I told them I would give them an answer Saturday, but they did not wait, and instead put the machines in."

Relative to faro and other gambling, Sheriff Word says they have all been closed since he gave orders to that effect in July. He heard that a faro game was going on secretly, and went to the place and ascertained that there was no truth in the report.
