

ASSESSMENT FOR TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

Is \$600,000 More than Last Year--Householders Get No Exemptions--County is Assessed at \$2,603,863.

Assessor A. M. Hare completed the assessment of Tillamook county on Tuesday, and it will be seen that it foots up \$2,603,863, being \$600,000 more than it was last year. The assessor has not allowed any exemptions to householders.

In answer to a letter sent by Assessor A. M. Hare to Attorney General A. M. Crawford in regard to exemptions, the latter replied: "Yours of the 30th ultimo, requesting my opinion as to whether you should allow householders exemption on your assessment of this year has my attention. I have held that no exemption can be allowed on this year's assessment for the reason that the law which was in effect on the first day of March last, which is the time all assessments for this year are in effect, did not allow any exemption. All assessments are made as of the first of March of each year, and the law enacted by the legislature at its special session did not go into effect until March 23, 1904. This left the law as enacted at the regular session, allowing no exemption to householders, in effect at the first of March and consequently none can be allowed for this year. The new law allowing exemption having now gone into effect, it will govern the next assessment and consequently the exemption will be allowed as usual next year and thereafter unless some other change is made by the legislature."

General News.

Many of Bryan's followers in the West won't have Parker, but will vote for Watson and Debs. The remainder will keep right on voting for the distinguished editor of the Commoner.

The La Grande sugar factory begins on its full run of sugar beets this week, and besides the 25,000 tons from Grand Ronde Valley fields, 500 tons will be transported to the factory from Echo, Umatilla County. Many tons of beets have been dug and gathered from the fields the last week, and hundreds of people are engaged in this work.

The White Star Line steamer Celtic, which sailed Saturday from Queenstown for New York, carried 3350 souls, believed to be the largest number ever taken in one vessel from a British port. Nine hundred and fifty of them embarked at Queenstown, and about 100 steerage passengers were left behind on account of lack of accommodations.

A new industry is being started at Aberdeen, Wash., in the shape of salting salmon for the foreign market. A quantity of the fish in 600-pound barrels has been shipped to Germany, and reached there in excellent condition. Both fish barrels were "home industry," the fish being caught in the bay and the barrels manufactured at the stove factory.

A deal has been closed whereby O. W. Hurd takes over the interests of the C. Timmons Company and S. Elmore Company pertaining to the salmon business on the Siuslaw River, and all the interests have been consolidated under the title of the O. W. Hurd Packing Company. In addition to this, Mr. Hurd has extensive interests in the lumber industry on the Siuslaw, and controls three steamers, the L. Roscoe, Marguerite and Mink.

The New York Herald, which espouses the cause of Parker without giving a good reason why, has been polling members of the Produce Exchange. Of 976 replies received, 680 declare emphatically for Roosevelt and 296 much less emphatically for Parker. Some of the Parker men voted for McKinley in 1900, but almost as many Roosevelt men supported Bryan in 1900, and say that if they must support a platform in which all the good features are republican they might as well take the republican platform as a whole, plus Roosevelt, who is greater by far than Parker.

Deer are being slain abundantly by both professional and novice in Southern Oregon this season. The heavy fires have driven them out of the mountains and they have been obliged to seek retreat in the open fields of the lowlands. One farmer, who lives near Grant's Pass, stated Saturday that he has recently seen whole herds of deer in his fields, the animals having been driven down by forest fires. While this condition is not general, it is a fact, nevertheless, that there are more deer in the Southern Oregon valleys this summer than have been known for many years, and it can only be ascribed to the forest fires.

Sunday was a quiet day in La Grande, all saloons and all cigar stores in the city being closed for the first time in its history. Drug stores were only open for a short time. The order by County Sheriff Pennington went into effect Sunday.
