#### GAMBLERS ARE PULLED! AND PLEAD GUILTY.

Grand Jury is Drawn---Sheriff Woolfe and Marshal Quick called Before It -- Have not Done their Duty -- But Little Difference between a Gambler and a Burglar, says the Judge.

It is about five years since a grand jury was impanelled in Tillamook county. and when the circuit court was convened on Monday District Attorney McNary asked that one be drawn. This was done and the following persons were son, foreman, Alex. McNair, W. B. Alderman, Louis Johnson, N. McMillan, Jacob Pesterfield and Frank Fowler.

Judge Burnett instructed the grand jury as to its duties, after which it retired to consider the criminal cases on the docket and other cases that the district attorney desired investigated.

True bills were returned against T. B. Handley, jr., W. Stephens and Howard had left the county a warrant was issued for his arrest. Stephens and Handley pleaded guilty and Judge Burnett imposed a fine on them of \$75.00 each. The fines were paid.

C. A. Vogler, W. Hamilton, C. B. Hadley and C. E. Hadley were indicted for permitting gambling on their premises. As it was pointed out that C. E. Vogler, Hamilton and C. B. Hadley pleaded guilty and the Judge find them \$150 each. The fines were paid.

The Judge commenting upon the question of gambling, called attention to the fact that some were also up for larceny and pointed out that in both crimes the law recognizes one element in which they are alike, namely, in that each obtains money for which he gives nothing in re turn.
