The plans and bids for a new court house are to be in by next Monday, when an adjourned meeting of the county court will be held to consider the matter. We understand that County Judge W. W. Conder has been making some investigation whether the county court has authority to go ahead and build a new court house and issue warrants with the present indebtedness of about \$30,000.

The county court will meet next Monday, when the matter of prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in the county will come up under the local option law, which was carried in the recent election. An effort will be made, so we are informed, to defeat the vote of the people and have the county court declare against prohibition. A good deal of care was taken by the county court and county officials in carrying out their duties, and people are getting a little anxious to see how the court stands and what will be the objections raised to override the will of the people in Tillamook County.

Ed. Walker is Dead.

Our readers will be sorry to hear that Ed. Walker died early Wednesday, after a short illness. He was out-sawing wood on Saturday, when an attack of erysipelas in the face and nose came on and he went to a doctor. The deceased thought at first that it was only a boil on the nose and treated it as such. It grew worse, and either caused blood poisoning or affected his brain, which caused his death. He was born April 18, 1863, in O'Clare, Wis., and came to Tillamook in 1888. He was married on the 16th August, 1891, to Miss Ida Vaughn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Vaughn. The deceased leaves a sorrowing wife and affectionate daughter, Miss Hattie, and a large number of relatives and friends to mourn his death. He was a member in good standing in the Woodman lodge in this city. On Thursday the remains were buried at Bay View cemetery, the Woodmen having charge of the funeral, which was attended by a large number of people. The bereaved wife and daughter have the sympathy of the entire community.

The City Ticket.

There was a large attendance at the opera house on Saturday evening for the purpose of nominating a city ticket. For several days previous those who have been active in behalf of having the laws enforced interviewed a number of the leading citizens to get them to serve. Office seekers were exceedingly scarce, but after much persuasion several consented to allow their names to be proposed in the city caucus.
 Mr. A. J. Cohn was chosen chairman and Mr. H. T. Botts secretary.
 Mr. B. L. Eddy addressed the meeting in the course of which he referred to the little differences which divided the citizens over city affairs, and thought this a good

opportunity to work for the best interest of the city, and in nominating Mr. F. R. Beals for mayor, he paid that gentleman a high tribute for the energy he displayed in business, and thought he was a most desirable person for the position, for the city contained many landmarks of his enterprise and push.
 No other nominations were made, and Mr. Beals was declared the nominee for mayor on the citizen's ticket. He was

called up and briefly stated that he would do all in his power to give the city a business administration and would enforce the laws.

The only contest was over the nomination for city marshal. N. J. Myers, Fred Arthur and W. T. Wolfe, all good men, were placed in nomination. On the second ballot the race was between Arthur and Myers, the former winning by only a few votes.
