### ANOTHER VICTORY!

For Law and Order—The Opposition Piles into Headlight's Band Wagon.

### HOT CONTESTED ELECTION

Citizen's Ticket will Control the Council—Saloon Keepers Put Another Nail in their Coffins.

The unexpected happened in Tillamook City last week when the gambling fraternity, saloon faction and their hangers on surprised everybody in the city when they came out in print in favor of the enforcement of the laws. Such a double somersault into the Headlight's band wagon was enough to arouse Old Nick's wrathful indignation and wonder what was next going to happen in this city of political rottenness which he claimed as his own possession for years. Saloon keepers, gamblers, card dealers and their political pups all posing as reformers was something that His Satanic Majesty could not understand. Neither could the citizens of Tillamook City. They were thunder struck, amazed and wondered to see so many sudden conversions. Dad Hadley and his henchmen reformers? Gee! Why didn't they call out the band, set off fire crackers, and yell at the top of their voices for so amazing transformation. What had brought on this sanctimonious air in people who have interests in saloons and gambling joints? Was it that the women of Tillamook City were on the war path and were after the lords of creation who were robbing them out of the necessities and comforts of life, alienating the affections of their husbands, destroying the lives of their sons, and oft time their daughters to satisfy the avarice and the passions of those who run gambling joints? Or was it that at no distant date the whole secret of the rottenness will some day be made public? How the Headlight man is going to get along with this conglomeration in his band wagon, all yelling for the enforcement of the law, is hard to tell, for it remains to be seen whether it is not Dad Hadley's and his henchmen's wide open gambling laws the saloon faction intends enforcing, if they can, and not the state laws and city ordinances.

### The Women's Meeting.

The women's meeting at the opera house on Saturday evening night was largely attended, which was called in the interest of the enforcement of the law and in support of the citizen's ticket, which was nominated for that purpose. Several meetings were held the previous day by a number of women, with a course of action was decided upon, with the result that committees visited most every house in the city with an invitation to attend the mass meeting. Mrs. Hays presided at this meeting and the speakers were A. W. Severance, Mrs. T. B. Handley, H. T. Botts, F. R. Beals and B. L. Eddy. Some of the speakers were exceedingly personal in their remarks, and showed that the opposition ticket was nothing but C. B. Hadley's nominees, and they ridiculed the idea that the gamblers who were nominated in opposition to the citizen's ticket would enforce the law. Although "hot shots" were poured into Geo. Cohn, M. F. Leach, Emmett Quick and Thos. Coates, the audience appeared to be thoroughly in accord with what was said, for every sally met with a round of applause, in which the women participated. The speeches were interspersed with instrumental and vocal music and recitations, all of which were creditably rendered.

### The Election.

The election passed off quietly on Monday without any broken heads, although there was considerable hard feeling over the contest. The citizens' caucus nominated F. R. Beals for mayor, G. B. Alley for recorder, Ralph Ackley for treasurer, Fred Arthur for marshal, who subsequently declined, and for councilman P. McIntosh, H. T. Botts, Homer Mason, A. T. White and L. Hiner. All these nominations were unanimous with the exception of Arthur. The saloon faction and gambling fraternity took exceptions to some of these nominees, so nominated George Cohn for mayor, Thos. Coates for recorder, O. E. Quick for marshal and W. O. Chase to oppose McIntosh in the first ward (although Chase had proposed McIntosh in the citizen's caucus) and M. F. Leach to oppose Botts in the second. W. C. Wolfe was an independent candidate for marshal. The result of the election was a moral victory for the law enforcement party, for they have again reduced the saloon faction's majorities in previous years and have the controlling vote in the new city council. Cohn's majority was only 27, while last year his faction had a majority of 56. Botts gave Leach a close call in the second, for the latter had only a majority of four votes. Had it not been for the illegal voting in that ward Botts would have won out and the other majorities would have been reduced. The result of the election is as follows:

For Mayor—George Cohn, 115; F. R. Beals, 88.

### The Saloon Keepers' Bad Break.

The saloon faction is entitled to crow over their imaginary victory on Monday. But it is nothing but another defeat that the law enforcement party administered to the saloon keepers, who are gradually being shorn of their domineering power in their very strongholds. The law enforcement party is in control of the city council and it forced the opposition to declare itself also for the enforcement of the law. That alone is a victory, but we never expected to see the opposition get into the Headlight's band wagon, which it has done, and whoop it up for what we have been contending for. We will gladly accept them as our converts and will be glad for them to help us in purifying city politics and clearing up the "rottenness" which has been going on for years, the particulars of which would make most every citizen's eyes bug out of their socket. Enough on that score. Taking the vote for last year, F. R. Beals reduced the majority of the saloon faction one half and H. T. Botts' support in the second ward proves that the saloon faction is fast losing the hold it had on the voters in their own strongholds. That fact is not very reassuring for them. But it was a costly victory for the saloon keepers if they will put on their considering caps for one moment. They went into the fight for the express purpose of defeating some of the nominees on the citizens' ticket, and the men who are a credit to Tillamook City. They succeeded, however, but it is only a trifling success and another object lesson for the voters to study over whenever local option is voted upon in the county again. The saloon keepers made another foolish move in dabbling in city politics at this time, when their best policy would have been "hands off." Had they done that it would have been possible to defeat local option at the next county election. The saloon keepers have now made that almost impossible by butting in, fighting and defeating part of the citizens' ticket, for whenever the local option law is voted upon again the saloon keepers will find that they have only placed another weapon in the hands of the people to resent the domineering attitude the saloon keepers have taken to down respectable citizens

who do not train with the saloon faction. The saloon keepers were not content to let the citizens' ticket alone, but made a personal and vindictive fight against some of the nominees. This raised the ire of those who were attacked and the fight became fierce. The law enforcement party will not forget for a long time the active part the saloon keepers took to bring about the defeat of a ticket which would have been a credit to the citizens of Tillamook City and a blessing to the community. To sum up this another factional fight in city politics, it can be claimed that the law enforcement party has gained a victory and the saloon keepers have put another nail in their own coffins which the people will drive home whenever an opportunity presents itself.

### Opportunity to Enforce the Law

Quite a number of people are greatly concerned where the city will obtain the necessary money to meet the expenses of running the city government. We have not said much yet on the subject, but we want to put the people of Tillamook City on to something, and which can be done legally and will furnish enough money for the next twelve months. As some of the saloon keepers have violated their licenses and pleaded guilty to the same, let the city council revoke their licenses and hold the bondsmen liable for the amount of their bonds, the conditions of which were read in open council when the city fathers voted to accept them. If the present city council will do its duty, there is only one thing for it to do, and that is to revoke the license and hold the bondsmen accountable. The circuit court journal, with a plea of guilty and a sentence for violating the conditions under which the licenses were granted, is prima facie evidence and proof enough for the city authorities to go on, which would mean the forfeiture of the saloon license money and no way out of it for the bondsmen but to pay up. Will the city council do its duty to the city, or will it go on record as approving bonds just as a matter of formality? Anyway, what is the use of putting saloon keepers under bonds, if, when they violate the law, their bondsmen are not held responsible. The city has a dead clutch on several thousand dollars if the city council will do its duty, and at the same time will put the city in good shape financially and relieve the present city council of the stigma of leaving the city in bad shape financially. If the present city council won't do its duty and enforce the law, the new city council is pledged to and should do so. There ought to be no backing down.

The band boys serenaded the newly elected officers on Monday and Tuesday evenings, and there was much rejoicing and shouting on Monday evening as a result of the election on Main street.
