SHAH PAYS PRICE. Indemnity for Murder of Missionary

Washington, Jan. 8.-Information has reached the State Department that, complying with the insistent demands of the United States, the Persian government has made to the widow partial reparation of the murder of the Rev. Benjamin W. Labarree, an American missionery, by a gang of fanatics, and has promised that all the guilty persons involved in the crime will be punished. The following statement regarding the case was made by an official of the State Depart-

"March 15 last the Department of State received the telegraph intelligence of the murder of Rev. W. Labarree, an American missionary, near Ouroma, in Persia, by a gang of fanatic Kurds.

"A demand was immediately made for the arrest and trial of the murderers. whose leader, Seyd Mir Ghafar, was Prophet.
