Delay in Cattle Shipments.

One of the difficulties with which western cattle men have had to contend has been the slow runs made by stock trains. There has been more complaint from that source this year than from freight rates, as shippers have felt that they would not care so much about the rates if their shipments would only reach their destination at the time expected. Owing to the delays along the road much loss has been occasioned through excess shrinkage and by the stock arriving on the markets late in the day, for late arrivals seldom sell to as good advantage as those that are offered early in the morning. There are of course times when stock that gets in late sells to a better advantage, but that is only in a case of a shortage, which very seldom happens during the western season.

There is a growing demand on the part of shippers for a time guaranty as a part of the regular shipping contract. Under the present system the shipper has to take all the risk as to the length of time required for the run, as the railroad simply has to deliver the goods in good condition. Traffic managers are very naturally opposed to any time limit in the contract and will not agree to any such concessions so long as they can avoid it. It looks very much, however, as though a railroad is in the same position as any other contractor. When a man lets a contract for a building he usually puts a time limit in the contract for the completion of the work and the contractor agrees to forfeit a certain sum for each day's delay after the specified time. Why should not a railroad forfeit a certain amount of the tariff when there is a delay in completing the shipping contract? The value of the services to the shipper depend upon the promptness of the railroad in fulfilling the terms of the contract, and why should the shipper be made to pay full price for unsatisfactory work?

It is very evident that the railroads have forced shippers to stand these losses caused by poor service simply because the shippers were not in position to refuse the terms offered. It is doubtful, however, if such conditions will last very much longer, as western cattlemen realize that they need the railroads and the railroads know that they need the cattlemen, and as the organization of the latter becomes stronger there is no doubt but what they will be able to get many concessions which heretofore have been refused.

S. B. Trissel, who has just returned from Orient, where he has been for many months as correspondent for the Associated Press, passed through Portland on his way to San Francisco. Mr. Trissel, in addition to furnishing news for the world through the medium of the Associated Press, has been a close observer of the shaping of events during the Russian-Japanese war. He is convinced that Russia will be the nation to see for peace; that Japan will have Corea and that Manchuria will revert back to China, and that the Flowery Kingdom will pay the freight. Mr. Trissel bases his belief that China will be compelled to pay a great part of the expenses of the present war in the Orient because Russia cannot be compelled to pay a large war indemnity. He is also firmly convinced that Russia will lose the territory that she tries to hold because it is too far away from home and that Russia, in spite of all her claims, cannot defend it successfully. He stated that her home resources and her international position will demand her entire attention at home.

General Nogi on Sunday reported the delivery of Russian prisoners under the capitulation of Port Arthur. The total of the prisoners was 878 officers and 23,491 men, which wereof 441 officers and 228 orderlies were given parole so far. General Smynoff, General Fock, General Gorbatoysky and Admiral Wilmann preferred to be sent to Japan as prisoners, while Stoessel will leave Dainy for home on January 12. Besides the above there were 16,000 wounded Russians in Port Arthur.

The efforts of the various temperance societies of Germany have been ineffectual in checking the increase of the consumption of beer by the German nation. Statistics just published show that while 71 gallons of beer were consumed per head during the year 1884, the consumption per head of population during 1904 rose to 110 gallons.

SHAH PAYS PRICE.

Indemnity for Murder of Missionary.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Information has reached the State Department that, complying with the insistent demands of the United States, the Persian government has made to the widow partial reparation of the murder of the Rev. Benjamin W. Labarce, an American missionary, by a gang of fanatics, and has promised that all the guilty persons involved in the crime will be punished. The following statement regarding the case was made by an official of the State Department:

"March 15 last the Department of State received the telegraph intelligence of the murder of Rev. W. Labarce, an American missionary, near Orouma, in Persia, by a gang of fanatic Kurds. A demand was immediately made for the arrest and trial of the murderers, whose leader, Seyd Mir Ghafar, was looked upon as a lineal descendant of the Prophet. This circumstance and the fear of arousing religious disturbances obviously interfered with the prompt and efficient action on the part of the local authorities. The most pressing and earnest representations of the American Legation at Teheran remained fruitless until October 12, when Mr. Ray instructed its Minister by cable to make known to the government of the Shah the Hresient's concern in the adequate punishment of all the criminals and his intention to lay the matter before Congress with appropriate recommendations, with his demand for full justice, were further delayed.

"The murders were thereupon arrested, but the Persian government, holding the life of a descendant of the Prophet sacred, offered a pecuniary indemnity in lieu of the death penalty for Seyd Mir Ghafar and promised execution of the accomplices. After consultation with the widow of Rev. Mr. Labarce the offer was accepted and an indemnity of \$30,000—greatly in excess of the sum named by the widow—was paid to the American Legation June 3. Solemn assurance was given that the guilty would receive effective and swift punishment and that no special law would be levied on Christians in the province to recover the amount of the indemnity."

The President has complimented United States Consul Peterson at Teheran for the energetic and efficient manner in which he has managed the case there.
