Vasaliefski Island is being watched with anxiety by the entire city. There lurks the greatest dangers. The workers on the island are practically penned in, troops barring and blocking the approaches to every bridge leading into St. Petersburg. The grave and terrible question of the hour is whether the men on the island will be able to make their way into the city. If they do the city may become theirs.
