Mrs. Frank Batter Killed.

Mrs. Eleanor W. E. Batter, wife of Frank Batter, foreman of the Government moorings at Linnton, was killed Friday afternoon shortly after 4 o'clock supposedly by Northern Pacific, No. 7, within sight of her home at Linnton. Just how Mrs. Batter met her death may always remain a mystery. It was evident that she was not struck by the train, for beyond a deep scalp wound in the back of her head no bones were broken, nor was the body mutilated. Deputy Coroner A. L. Findley was notified of the death of Mrs. Batter, and after viewing the remains he had the body brought to Portland.

Mr. Batter and his wife lived in a neat little cottage near the moorings. Friday afternoon, while he was busy attending to some work, he noticed his wife, with a bucket in her hand, leave for the house of a neighbor, a short distance away, for the purpose of getting some milk, just a few minutes before the arrival of the Northern Pacific train, which passed through Linnton about 4:37. He also saw her returning. She was within a couple of hundred yards of him when he heard the train pass, but thought nothing of it until he recalled that his wife had had plenty of time to have reached him. Fearing something wrong, he first went to the house, and not finding her there, started to walk up the track. He had gone but a short distance when he found the body of his wife, lying alongside of the railroad track dead.

As near as can be learned Mrs. Batter was walking along the track toward her home when caught in a deep cut. She had evidently had time to get off the track, so as to avoid the train, but as the engine swept on she was caught in the whirling eddy which follows in the wake and hurled about with such violence that it caused her death. Train No. 7, the one which killed Mrs. Batter, passed this point at a terrific rate of speed. Engineer W. S. Kayler, who was in charge of the train, stated to the Coroner that he did not see a woman at the point where Mrs. Batter's body was found, nor had he seen any person alongside the track.

Mr. and Mrs. Batter were married two years ago, being well known in Tillamook City, where Mr. Batter had charge of the government work. The deceased was Miss Eleanor W. E. Redberg, daughter of Mr. Redberg, who reside at Nestucca. The remains were buried on Tuesday in the Lone Fir Cemetery at Portland.

The lion's den, the fiery furnace, the cursed cross are only comparative to the shame and disgrace, and the heart felt agony of being judged a raving maniac for this strange doctrine. If Daniel, Shadrack, Meshack and Abendego or Christ were here today, we would ignore the den, the furnace, or cross to bring them to humiliation. We would simply banish them to an insane asylum.

The West and South have grown so rich that they are now able to finance their own industries. Formerly New York and the Eastern money centers were annually drawn upon for funds to move the crops, handle the cattle shipments and perform all of the service in the marketing of the products of the West and South. As a natural result, when shipping time arrived the producers sent their shipments to the East, most of them being necessary to discharge obligations for money advanced. The men who had loaned the money were interested in the railroads leading toward the Atlantic and thus drew double tolls from the producers. All this has been changed to a very remarkable degree within the last few years. The West and South have their banks filled with money seeking investment and are able to finance "their own affairs. Many farmers of the West are now lenders instead of borrowers.

At the joint session of the Washington Legislature, Samuel H. Piles was elected United States Senator from Washington, to succeed Addison G. Foster of Tacoma.

The Russian advance movement upon the Japanese left and center has ended, disastrously for the enemy, and the Japanese forces have driven back the attack and conquered all along line. In many places the fighting, which has raged furiously for three days, has ceased, and in the vicinity of Sandepu, Japanese soldiers are now engaged in dislodging the enemy from the village which they captured Friday. Field Marshal Marquis Oyama has sent several dispatches to the imperial military headquarters. The last one, deciphered Sunday evening states that the enemy is in full retreat and has abandoned his attempt to turn our left flank.

Republicans of the state legislature are discussing a plan to bring the body together again six months or a year hence. They say that emergencies are likely to arise before the session of the next law, making body such as will need the attention of the legislature, and, as a Democratic governor would probably not summon a Republican legislature to deal with those emergencies, the members should devise a plan for meeting independently of the Chief Executive.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, of Carbonate, Pa., has in resolutions noting that more and more women are making use of such expressions as "My Lord" and "Good heavens," declared against this "swearing among women." A resolution looking to a movement for its suppression was passed.
