

Death of Mrs Fannie H. Carter.

Mrs. Fannie H. Carter aged 82 years died at the family residence on Spring street Wednesday afternoon, May 11, 1905. She died from a chair a few months ago, and while in a frail condition, the fall aggravated her case and made a recovery impossible. She had been a resident of Ashland thirty years.

Bad Runaway Accident.

While driving home from Dallas, Wednesday evening, District Attorney John H. McNary was severely injured in a runaway accident. Mr. McNary, in company with W. H. Holmes and Webster Holmes, left for home after court had adjourned in the evening, and as they crossed the steel bridge at Salem their team became frightened at a flickering electric light and ran down the bridge toward Commercial street, the driver having lost control of them.

Yesterday's Statement says Mr. McNary was resting easy late Wednesday night, although he had not entirely recovered consciousness. The injury sustained is directly over the left eye, but so far as the surgeon can ascertain, there is no fracture of the skull.

Moro Outlaw is Driven to Swamp.

MANILA, May 14.—Fierce fighting has been going on the last few weeks on the Island of Jolo, between the outlaw Moro chief Pala, with 600 well-armed followers, and troops under the personal command of Major-General Leonard Wood. Pala's losses thus far are 300 killed, while those of General Wood are seven killed and 19 wounded. Pala and his remaining followers, in accordance with Moro tradition, prefer death to capture.

General Wood, with detachments from the Fourteenth Cavalry, the Seventeenth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third Infantry and constabulary scouts, has driven Pala and his followers into a swamp, which has been surrounded.

Pala was a noted slave trader and warrior when the Americans occupied the islands. Later he escaped with his followers to the Island of Pala Sekar, near Borneo. One of Pala's leaders deserted and took refuge in the British settlement at Lahad, Pala, dis-covering his whereabouts, landed with a following and demanded of the British magistrates that he turn the deserter over to him. The demand was not complied with, and Pala ordered a massacre. Twenty-five persons, including several British were killed. Pala escaped to the Island of Jolo and organized the present uprising.

It is reported that the Borneo authorities requested General Wood to apprehend Pala dead or alive, and turn him over to them.

An export reports that the valuation of the street railways of Chicago is \$50,000,000. This must refer to the sponge before it is distended with about six times its weight in water.

The Kansas oil refinery law provides for the employment of convict labor. In order to make it skilled labor the Kansans propose to give the Standard company an indeterminate jail sentence.

Vermont has a new law providing that all waste and uncultivated lands planted with timber forest trees under rules prescribed by the state forester shall be exempt from taxation for ten years. In passing the act the legislature proceeded on the idea that the first loss in taxable value would be more than made up eventually.

Charles Wilkins, of the steamer Oregon, paid a \$50 fine at Corvallis for violating the local option law. He sold intoxicants from the steambot to Corvallis customers in the belief that the boat being in the river made it a safe asylum for his traffic. Four persons have pleaded guilty and paid \$50 fines within the past few days.

Special reports have been received from 42 Kansas counties regarding the enforcement of the prohibitory law. Of these 19 report the existence of licensed saloons. Over 480 saloons in Kansas are paying licenses to the different city governments. The information has been placed before Governor Hoch to form a basis for his coming order to close all liquor-selling enterprises in the state.

Last Saturday was Oregon day at the White House, all right. At 10:30 the President deceptitated W. F. Matthews and appointed Charles J. Reed to succeed him as United States Marshal for Oregon. At 11 he indicated his preference that Judge William H. Hunt, of Montana, should sit in the land trials at Portland and decided that, for the time being, no successor to Judge Bellinger should be appointed. At 11:30 the President sent for Vice-President Fairbanks and requested him to be his representative at Portland at the opening of the Lewis and Clark Exposition of June 1. At 11:45 the President declared his willingness, in fact his eagerness, to press the button which will open the Lewis and Clark Exposition. At noon the President appointed Assistant Secretary of the treasury H. A. Taylor chairman of the Lewis and Clark Government Board. He then went to lunch.
