

## Editorial Snap Shots.

Arrest and fine everybody who gambles, not forgetting the "squealers."

It is just as bad, if not worse, for a city to allow a lot of kids to throw dice in the stores as to allow gambling.

Tillamookers do not appear to be at all excited on account of the glowing account of the prospect of getting a railroad in the near future, for they have on several previous occasions read glowing accounts of a like nature.

Wherever the railroad locates a new town most of the business men of this will be falling over themselves to be on the ground floor, for it is pretty well conceded that wherever the terminus of the railroad is located a large manufacturing town will spring up.

"Having accepted the nominations for mayor and councilmen of the various wards, we desire to state that if elected we will do all in our power to enforce the LAW and ORDINANCES of Tillamook City, without fear and without favor, especially the laws against gambling."

If anyone has obtained a wrong impression from what we have said about Judge Conder receiving witness fees in the Turner case, we did not say that he was not legally entitled to them. In justice to himself and Judge Conder we think it just to correct any wrong opinion that may have gained ground.

Some people seem to gloat over the downfall of Senator Mitchell. But he is no worse than city officials who take money from gamblers and saloon keepers to privilege them to run gambling joints. That was done in Tillamook City for a long time. First put a stop to the bribery and corruption right at home, but until then no city or community should be too ready to cast the first stone at Senator Mitchell.

If Rollie will please tell who wrote or helped him "roast" Alva Finley, one of the most respected young men in Tillamook, it would be greatly to the point. Just fancy, in this 20th century, with all our boasted liberty of free speech and free press, when the whiskey press of this city has to jump onto a person for expressing their views upon a matter of public policy when asked to do so for publication.

It is plain to see that the promoters of the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook Railway intend giving Tillamook City the cold shake, with the purpose of establishing a manufacturing town elsewhere. This is what most everybody expected a railroad would do directly it tapped the country, so on that account no one need be surprised to hear that Tillamook City is liable to be sidetracked. But that is too bad for the city, after almost burying itself with a mortgage plaster.

The gamblers think themselves awfully smart in being able to run games in this city and without any interference from peace officers who are paid to enforce the law. One of these days they will run up against a fine and imprisonment, and then they won't feel so smart doing time. Sheriff Word, of Multnomah county, is a right kind of an officer, even if he is a democrat, for whenever there is gambling going on in Portland he swoops down upon it and arrests the whole shooting match. That is the kind of sheriff the people of this county will elect before another year rolls round, and when they do that it will soon put a stop to gambling, "blind pigs," etc., and which will keep a lot of dead beats away from the city and county.

Senator John H. Mitchell has been tried and found guilty, and as a public servant his doom is sealed. There is no denying the fact that a very large number of his constituents feel exceedingly pained at his downfall, for he has been made the victim of circumstances and political spleen in his declining years. He has been hounded to death, betrayed by friends and the land sharks, who, to save themselves, turned state's evidence. Our whole system of government is impregnated with bribery and corruption. It is rampant in most cities, in county and state, as well as national affairs, and if reports are correct, the United States Senate needs purifying. Now that President Roosevelt has made a start at putting a stop to bribery and corruption, it is to be hoped that Oregon will not be the only state singled out and Senator Mitchell made a scape goat for others who are more deeply dyed in political corruption than he is. The verdict that was rendered in Portland on Monday is far reaching, for it is a staggering blow at a system of bribery and corruption which have been allowed to prevail and with but few public men with the courage to come out openly and fight it. Although we feel grieved at the downfall of Senator Mitchell, it is to be hoped his error will have something to do with putting a stop to so much bribe giving and bribe taking, but justice will not be served if the bribe giver is allowed to go free and the bribe taker is convicted. Senator Mitchell should step aside and allow Oregon to have another representative in the senate.

## Bids for Wilson River and Nestucca Bridges Let—Justice Alley Resigns.

The board of county commissioners, composed of County Judge W. W. Conder and Commissioners Geo. W. Bodyfelt and Geo. Loerpel were in session on Wednesday and Thursday and transacted a large amount of business, which was as follows:

Bids of Olds & Harris to build the Wilson River bridge and Nestucca bridge rejected and clerk ordered to return certified check; also the bids of A. C. U. Berry and Bunnell Construction Company for the same purpose.

Bid of W. D. Wood to build the Wilson river bridge and the Nestucca bridge accepted and it was ordered that contract be entered into by the court, the bids were as follows:

In the matter of a road of public easement for Geo. N. Hodgdon, it was ordered that F. L. Sappington, John Hickey and M. D. Reading be appointed viewers to meet Saturday, July 22.

In the matter of a road of public easement for C. N. Illingsworth, it appearing to the court that the petitioner had not complied with the law, the same was dismissed.

In the matter of the bond of J. H. Oliver and James Christensen, road petitioners, it appearing to the court that the bond is sufficient and in due form in the sum of \$1000, it was approved.

Claim of B. J. Stephens for \$3 and J. A. Dawson for \$1.00 was reconsidered and allowed.

In the matter of the appointment of road supervisor for district No. 6, it was ordered that A. Arstelt be appointed to fill the vacancy to take effect August 1.

It appearing to the court that I. M. Smith, M. D., is a competent and duly licensed physician, it was ordered that he be appointed secretary of the Board of Health for Tillamook County.

In the matter of the appointment of fire wardens, on petition of the Hammond Lumber Co., William Riefenberg, of Bay City, was appointed forest ranger on the lands of above company in the Trask district, and George H. Williams, of Bay City, forest ranger on the lands of above company in the Nehalem district, to enter upon their duties upon filing the oath of office. On petition of the Blodgett Lumber Company, William R. Illingsworth was appointed forest ranger in the Wilson River district.

In the matter of the petition of G. H. Ward for rebate of taxes, the same was rejected.
