Right of Way is Secure.

HILLSBORO, Or., July 22 .- All of the right of way for the Portland, Nehalem & Tillamook Railway has been procur ed as far as Banks, and Chief Engineer Geo. L. Davis reports that the contract or clearing the right of way has been let to H. H. Clark and James Wilson of Forest Grove.

Contracts for bridge timbers for the two largest bridges on the line have been let to Carstens Bros & Hartley, Manning, W. H. Lyda, Greenville, and Thompson Bros, of Mountaindale, as w ll as contracts for ties for first few miles. Chief Davis this morning receivel word from the Atlas Contract & Supply Company, of San Francisco, that arrangements have been made for the rails for the first ten miles of road, and it is expected that track-laying will begin by September 1.

A portion of the grading has been let to subcontractors, and Mr. Davis states that the entire line will be let by the Dist. No. 23.- 54. Dist. No. 49.-33. end of next week. Grading will begin Dist. No. 24.- 19. on the Hillshoro end next week.

Contractors for the construction of the new railroad were here Wednesday looking over the right-of-way and are making arrangements to begin work. Contracts have been let for ties and bridge timbers, which will be hauled to the right of way just as soon as the mills can turn them out. It is intended to have the roadbed ready for the rails by September 1st, from this city to Banks, where the survey is now going on and right of way secured, and by January 1st, 1906, trains will be running to Buxton. Dr. W. D. Wood and F. M. Heidel left yesterday morning at 4 o'clock for St. Helens, where they go to get the concession from Thomas Connell for the right-of-way through his property adjoining this city.

Engineer Davis received instructions last Monday to go shead with the construction work on the new railroad from Hillsboro to Tillamook, and is now negotiating with the different saw mills for ties for the road. The officials were out from Portland Tuesday looking over the survey and viewing the work done on the Y at the depot. It looks as if we were going to have the railroad anyway, and there are many who still believe in the street car proposition. -Hillsboro Independent.

Postmaster General Cortelyou, like the recent predecessors, is in doubt as to the proper way to abolish this deficit. Hon. Jesse Overstreet, this deficit. Hon. Jesse Overstreet, chairman of the house committee on post offices and post roads, thinks he has the correct remedy. The rate for second-class mail is a cent a pound or fractional part thereof. Overstreet proposes to advance the rate to 3 or 4 cents a pound.

This would be such an injustice that all the newspapers and periodicals which do a legitimate business may be relied on to oppose it. Many things get into

on to oppose it. Many things get into the second-class mail that do not belong there. Some newspapers offer books or other articles as prizes, and they are thrown into this mail and carried at regular newspaper rates. Other papers give magazines away with their Sunday editions as bonuses for increasing their circulation. Publications like Lewis' Magazine of St. Louis, which are sold Magazine of St. Louis, which are sold at a figure—10, 20 or 25 cents—far below the cost of production, which are issued primarily to exploit some ulterior scheme of their promoter, and which rely on their advertisements to pay the expense of their printing, claim the right to be carried at the 1-cent-a-pound rate.

The proper way for Mr. Overstreet to do is to shut all these things out from the second-class division and make them pay third-class rates, as printed books, which are sold and printed circumstants.
