Nobody will doubt the patriotism or Republicanism of Senator Cullom, but his opinion that some sort of tariff revision is now imperative is open to question. It may seem untenable to resist revision absolutely. Such a position will surely lead to the misrepresentation that its logical contention is that the present law is the ultimatum of all fiscal legislation, and attaining even to the infallible. But such a misrepresentation is in no way justified in the attitude of those who insist that the existing situation is not such as to warrant experiments. The broad ground underlying their resistance to revision at this time is that none should be attempted until the protective principal is as thoroughly incorporated into the plan of government as free trade has long been incorporated into the plan of government of Great Britain. Senator Cullom is aware that, for more than a generation a change in party government in the British isles has ever threatened the perpetuation of the free-trade policy. Tremendous electoral campaigns have been waged around every question in the political cast, ministries have been voted out of office on new questions and sudden issues, and control of parliament has shifted from one party to another repeatedly, but the fiscal policy has never been seriously in doubt. Accordingly, revisions of such rates as are laid upon imports or exports are frequently made in London, and can be undertaken at any time without danger.
