New Transportation Company Organized.

Last Monday an initial step was taken by many of the leading merchants and business men of the city to procure better steamer service between Tillamook bay ports and Columbia River, and also to secure better tug service on this bay.
The name given the new company is the Tillamook Transportation & Tug Company.
The incorporators are: F. S. Whitehouse, President Tillamook Lumber Co.; C. B. Hadley, President Wilson River Lumber Co.; and R. W. Watson, editor of the Herald.
The new company is capitalized at \$25,000.00, all of which has been subscribed by the business men of the city.
At Monday's meeting the stockholders elected the following three directors: P. W. Todd, D. T. Edmunds and C. B. Hadley. They authorized Mr. F. S. Whitehouse and Mr. C. E. Hadley to go to Portland and there arrange if possible to buy the steamer Toledo, which was recently taken off the Coos Bay run. Messrs. Whitehouse and Hadley left for Portland yesterday, and if they are successful in purchasing the Toledo, the company will have the boat thoroughly repaired, and expect to install a new 150 H.P. engine, thus making her the fastest steamer of her size on the coast. At present, the boat has accommodations for forty passengers and is fully equipped for towing.
This boat, owned by Tillamook capital, will supply a long needed want and insures regular lumber shipments from this port. The greatest difficulty with which our milling men have had to deal is that of securing tug service for the many lumber schooners which enter and depart from this port. A few weeks ago the Guide, bound for this port, was waited outside for nearly three weeks to be towed into port, while the Oakland was obliged to abandon her intention of coming in here and went to Astoria, where she was later towed up the river to Vancouver for a cargo. The schooner Marion, from Frisco, bound for this port, waited outside the bar for ten days. Thus it is seen that the tug service is so unsatisfactory that shipping is seriously

impaired, and with a tug owned by local capital all former difficulties will be overcome.
