## Editorial Comment.

It is interesting. Will those who have bottled up Tillamook be able to continue the bottling-up process?

Tillamook City had a splendid opportunity to have added quite a bit in fines to the city treasurer after the racket on Halloween, but—but Tillamook City has not caught onto the idea of raising revenue that way and would rather keep on piling up its indebtedness. And this is no joke, either.

Approp of the road boss, boss business, John Hickey sprung a joke on the Headlight man in not getting next to an item of news, where the road boss and a county commissioner bossed the Hon. Callahan, of Garibaldi, doing county work for nearly two days. We apologize, John, for missing this item of news, but Callahan is not as smart as he used to be, for he should have put the bosses to work and bossed the job himself.

It is perfectly proper that Uncle Sam should go down in his jeans for money to improve the Columbia bar and the river as well to Portland, the metropolis of Oregon, but the long neglected, isolated Coast Counties would like a few of the crumbs that fall from the rich man's table for harbor improvements and to open up some of the best country in the state. We are not jealous of Portland and the big "pull" she has, but we regret that the Coast Counties haven't the same "pull."

Whenever the law is not enforced it is the taxpayers who have to go down in their jeans. When it is enforced, it is those who violate the law who have to go down in their jeans. We hope that the taxpayers of this county will not forget these two little points, and especially would we refer this to the consideration of our Granger friends in the south part of the county, who have, as we view it, started in to bark up the wrong tree. We have plenty of conclusive evidence at our finger's ends to prove that the taxpayers go down in their jeans when the law is enforced and the opposite when it is not.

The lumbering business in Tillamook Bay will never be a success until the tow boat question is settled, and settled right and to the interest of the port. And the proper way to settle that is a community of interest proposition. With a tow boat established on the bay, and with the assurance that it would stay there and not be monkeyed with, would be an inducement to capital to engage in lumbering. Therefore, we contend, it is necessary for the people of Tillamook to own a tow boat which cannot be monkeyed and tied or bought off. The port has been bottled up too long by that process by those who don't want any competition in the transportation, logging or lumbering business. The thing is to get started right, and without being tied up with those who want to monopolize the port and who retard and stunt its commercial growth. This will be a thing of the past as soon as it is possible to make this a free and open port for shipping. A tow boat, permanently established, it is plain to see, would do wonders in now getting started right and to make this a second Grays Harbor for the manufacture of lumber.

The Grange at Oretown passed some resolutions which are of a public nature, and which are sure to cause more or less discussion in the county, especially as an election is approaching, and when, no doubt, a large number of persons will be aspiring to serve the people, and incidentally to draw the pay that goes with the office. The Oretown Grange is certainly entitled to its opinion as to what salary should be paid county officials, for the taxpayers have to foot the bills, but we cannot understand why they have singled out the salaries of the sheriff and county clerk for curtailment and not any of the other officials. We must beg to differ with our Granger friends in the south part of the county in this particular, we do not think any of the county officials are drawing any too much pay for the responsible positions they occupy, and when they strictly attend to business and keep the records in good shape and account for the large sums of money that comes into their hands, they earn every cent they receive. We believe in economy as much as anyone, and we believe in having competent officials and paying them fair wages for so responsible positions. We do think, however, that it might be well to readjust the salaries of the county officials. For instance, allow the county commissioners for time it takes, going and coming, to attend commissioners' court, cut off the salary of the road boss, not pay out money to others for performing work which should be done by proper officials, etc. But this is enough this time to put the Grangers on the right track and we hope we shall hear from them again, for we are sure, although we may differ with them in some few particulars, it is because we look at the matter from two standpoints. ## The Next Congressman.

Although the election of a Congressman to represent the first congressional district at Washington is several months distant, there is considerable stir and candidates are coming from cover.

The election under the new direct primary law is a puzzle. The politicians do not know how to manipulate it, and the people are wondering what the ultimate result will be. No one can forecast the probable result, therefore the first trial and final outcome will create intense and wide spread interest.

In the congressional race there are entered so far four avowed candidates for the Republican nomination: Hon. Walter L. Tooe, of Woodburn; Hon. S. B. Huston, of Hillsboro; Hon. Chas. B. Moores, of Salem; Attorney Geo. W. Wright, of Albany.

Democratic candidates are slow to announce themselves, owing no doubt to the fact that it is not possible for them to overcome the large Republican majority of the First Congressional District.

This does not mean that there will be no Democratic candidates for congressional honors.

On the contrary, it is said that Hon. R. G. Smith, of Josephine county, will enter the race for the Democratic nomination.

And there will be others. I therefore being written in the history of past elections that the next Congressman elected from the First Congressional District will be a Republican, the people are becoming very greatly concerned in who that Republican will be who shall carry off the nomination at the primary election.

Among the candidates named who would be the most acceptable and useful in Linn county and this state, if nominated and elected?

That is the question that now confronts the rank and file of the Republicans of the First District, and it is up to them to decide.

The Times, independent in all things, neutral in nothing, has only the best of feeling for the other Republican candidates, but studying the question from every point of view, the answer appears to be: Walter L. Tooe.

Mr. Tooe is a prominent and a most successful self-made business man of Woodburn. No man is better known and esteemed throughout the district. A plain, practical man, sound on the great principles of the Republican party; possessed of a trained mind, an eloquent public speaker, a logical reasoner in debate, and a tireless worker.

The plea of Mr. Tooe before the recent Republican conference held in Portland, for the proper development of our coast harbors, an open Willamette River, development of the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon, and the application of correct principles in the works of government, swept the convention off the floor and into the air with applause, and placed him upon a square platform that is heartily approved by the people of the First Congressional District regardless of party affiliation.
