Reports from New York say that many holders of life insurance policies are refusing to pay further premiums on them, on account of the recent revelations of crookedness in some of the companies. This is folly.

There is a strong probability that most of the insurance companies are managed honestly and economically. Moreover, the big companies which are being looted by some of their officers are likely to be solvent still.

The death claims can undoubtedly be paid, but the holders of the ten, fifteen and twenty years term policies will not, at those policies' maturity, get any where near the amount which they were led to believe they would get, although the technically guaranteed payment will probably be net.

The sensible thing for the policy holders is to hang on to their policies and make the best terms possible with the companies. When the committee of inquiry in New York finishes with the Mutual, the New York life and the Equitable it will take up some of the other companies. It is fair to presume that the Hyes, Alexanders, McCall and McCurdy's will not be found defused through the whole insurance fraternity, or through any large part of it.
