City Election.

Apparently there was little interest taken in the city election on Monday, which was somewhat unusual for Tillamook, for in previous years more or less strife and friction have engendered into city politics. As is usual, but it came somewhat as a surprise, when it was known that another ticket was in the field, with H. T. Botts placed in nomination for mayor in opposition to Rollie W. Watson, who was nominated more as a joke than anything else at the citizens' caucus. W. C. Wolfe was up against W. H. Eberman for marshal and E. Jenkins against J. P. Allen in the second ward and Goran Munson against T. Coates in the third ward. The result was as follows:

Editorial Snap Shots.

We wonder whether Rollie feels like leaving the country?

A study of the votes cast at the city election does not show any change in the local option sentiment in this city.

There wasn't any whooping or yelling, crackers or bombs, on Monday evening. What a contrast to last year. What was the matter with your lungs, gentlemen? Did the blacksmith have them under repair?

We beg to differ with the majority of voters in Tillamook City. They made a mistake when they failed to elect W. C. Wolfe city marshal a year ago, and time will tell whether they have not made a like mistake this year.

We must congratulate Rollie W. Watson on his defeat, although he may not agree with us now, it is the best thing that could happen him after taking his first dose of city politics. And it is the best thing for the city, anyway. Shake, Bro. Rollie.

The Washington Wholesale and Retail Liquor Dealers' Association has commenced a crusade against gambling in saloons. That is a good move on their part, and they are evidently getting next to where the greatest objection is raised against saloons.

The HEADLIGHT didn't get an invitation to attend Rollie's hallelujah, high old time in the old town when he was to be heralded, branded and tattooed the High Mogul and Chief Muck-a-Muck of Tillamook City, to the music of "See the Conquering Hero, Come." It came off, however, but the invited guests felt—well, they were at Rollie's political funeral.

It is no place in the Pulpit nor in the Press to discuss the allegation that doctors are murdering unborn children. Let the Deputy District Attorney constitute himself a grand jury and sift the matter to the bottom. However, the Pulpit has thrown down the gauntlet, which has brought forth a reply that is highly libelous to the writer and the publisher if the accusations can be proven. Let there be an investigation by all means.

The Eugene Guard, which for years was one of the strongest democratic newspapers in the Willamette valley, has quit that party and in future it will be published as an independent newspaper. The county newspapers are becoming more independent, and this probably is a good thing, for politicians and those who want their private interests aired in the press will find they are up against a different proposition in future.

If there are any persons who are too

poor in Tillamook to subscribe for the Headlight the editor will be glad to send the paper free to them. There probably are a few persons situated that way in this county, but not many, and rather than see them deprived of the home newspaper, which is always a welcome visitor once a week to most every home in the county, we want to be seen and read in the homes of the poor as well as those who are comfortably fixed.

The city election is over and everybody is feeling good and satisfied, and we are glad to say with no hard feelings. This is as it should be. Now let everybody turn in and help the newly elected officials, for what the people want is a square deal, no special privileges to anybody to violate the law, and the tax money to be expended for the benefit of the city and not individuals. If that is done in the future there will be little or no friction in city politics. Tillamook is a good business city and the business of the city should be conducted along business lines, not in the interest of this or that business or faction. All that we ask of the newly elected city council is a business and economical administration with no special privileges and a square deal.

There is one thing in connection with the city election that we did not exactly appreciate, and that was to see a newspaper man go down to defeat, and beaten by an attorney. It is not often that they get the best of a newspaper man, and if Bro. Botts had been running against the Headlight man he wouldn't have stood a ghost of a show. He can just thank his lucky stars that he had only Rollie to beat. Oh, so easy. We are glad, however, that he is the mayor-elect and not the Headlight man, for we are going to criticise the city officials the coming year to beat the band if they do not enforce the law and make the city marshal earn his salary. And should the newly elected city dads get fighting mad with us, we'll call upon Rollie to help us, for we are sure he is just itching to wade in and knock the stuffin' out of the "crowd," as he calls them, that put up a ticket and opposed him.

After a long delay President Roosevelt has appointed Mr. B. L. Eddy register of the Roseburg land office, and in doing so he has put into office a clean, capable person, and one whom the president can place implicit confidence in, for Mr. Eddy is possessed of plenty of ability and with a clean record. In selecting persons for public office, the president is looking into their characters, and those who do not come up to the standard are turned down. This is right. We are sure that Mr. Eddy's Tillamook friends will be glad to hear of his appointment, and can coincide with Special Prosecutor Heney when he said at Washington that Mr. Eddy was eminently fitted for the position.

On account of the factional fight in the republican party, Mr. Eddy went down to defeat for circuit judge, but he has been elevated and honored by a president who is putting clean and capable men into public office.
