Articles incorporating the Clover Leaf Creamery Company were filed with the county clerk on Monday. The capital stock is placed at \$1,200, divided into 120 shares of the par value of \$10 each. The incorporators are B. H. Hathaway, T. T. Doughty and James Stasek.

George O. Nolan, indicted with Claude Thayer for land frauds, has sent his bond of \$500 to the clerk of the Federal court, and has signified his willingness to come to Portland to stand trial upon the indictment hanging over him. Nolan was arrested in Arizona about six weeks ago and given a preliminary hearing before a United States Commissioner.

The revivals at the Christian Church are still keeping up in interest and attendance. There have been five additional so far and others seem interested. On next Sunday evening the subject will be "My Religious History." This will be a narrative of the pastor's own life, groping out of the darkness of infidelity into the light of God's truth.

Patzlaff was to have had his advertisement in this issue, but was too busy to write one, as he was unpacking his Holiday Goods.

Master Mechanic D. M. McLachlan on Saturday, at McMinnville, ran the first engine on the new Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's line, under construction toward Tillamook. Twelve hundred feet of rails have been laid and a material yard is now started. Several cars loaded with rails are now on the way, and five miles of track will be laid by January 1. Superintendent Charles Lytle has men at work all along the first five miles and Chief Engineer Wanzler has moved his engineering camp to the front.

A dispute between E. S. McCoy and J. B. Wetherell over the acquisition of Tillamook County oil land has become so serious that they cannot settle it without the aid of the law. McCoy on Monday appealed to the State Circuit Court in Portland to compel Wetherell to deliver to him 2400 shares of stock in the Portland Coal & Development Company. McCoy sets forth in his complaint that he and Wetherell secured leases on oil land in Tillamook County on an equal partnership basis, 31 leases in all, embracing 6000 acres. On April 1 last they decided to transfer these leases to the Portland Coal & Development Company for 8000 shares of stock in the company. McCoy asserts each was to receive half of the stock, but after Wetherell received it all he turned over only 1600 shares.

The cases against the Elmore Packing Company and W. W. Ridelagh, for violating the fishing law, were to be tried in Justice Haberslach's court on Wednesday. Deputy Fish Warden Webster, who came in to make an investigation, swore out the complaints. It was expected that the cases would be fought out in court, on the grounds that Master Fish Warden Van Dusen had allowed the fishermen and cannerymen to violate the law on the Columbia river for two weeks last year. Ridelagh thought they ought to be given the same right to violate the law in Tillamook bay. Finding that that

kind of evidence would not be admissible, and to prevent further trouble in the fishermen being arrested, Ridelagh agreed to plead guilty to that understanding, and the justice imposed a fine of \$75 on him and a like amount upon the cannery company with costs.

Death and Burial of T. B. Handley

It is with much regret that we have to record the death of Mr. T. B. Handley, which occurred at his home in this city soon after midnight on Monday. For several months past he gradually failed in health, until about two weeks ago, when his condition became serious and alarmed his family. He made an attempt to get out on the steamer to go to a hospital in Portland, but owing to the rough weather she was unable to get out. Mr. Handley grew rapidly worse from day to day, and although he made a gallant fight for life, it was plain to all that he would succumb. The cause of his sickness was a complication of stomach trouble which had bothered him for a number of years, and when hemorrhage set in Dr. Smith gave up all hope of his recovery, and his wife and sons were advised that his death could be looked for at any time. Surrounded by his family and relatives, who had done everything that lay in their power for the sufferer, Mr. Handley passed peacefully away and rest asunder the ties that bound him to his family and friends.

Thomas Burton Handley was born of English parents, being the son of a sea captain, at Hobart Town, Tasmania, on

the 3rd September, 1841, which made him 64 years of age. When only nine years of age he landed in San Francisco, and followed the sea for some years. In 1866 he was admitted to the bar, and in 1867 was married to Lola I. Wolfe, and of this union there were three sons, Geo. Handley, who was drowned in Tillamook bay and Charley and T. B. Handley, Jr., who, with the wife, survive him. Mr. Handley first practiced law in Washington County and came to Tillamook about 15 years ago, and was one of the prominent attorneys of this county.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, the religious service being in the Methodist church and the burial in the Oddfellows' cemetery, conducted by the Rev. C. A. Stockwell, pastor of the church, assisted by the Revs. J. E. Connor, Geo. F. Zimmerman and A. S. Foster. Delegations from the Masonic lodge, Eastern Star and K.P. attended, the funeral arrangements being in charge of the former order. The church was well filled with friends who attended to show their last token of respect to the deceased and sympathy for the bereaved family. Mr. Stockwell preached the funeral discourse after which the remains were taken to the cemetery, and while the beautiful ritual of the Masonic order was being recited, the body was consigned to its resting place and beautiful flowers now adorn the grave.

Mr. Darby has moved back to the Prairie on his ranch.

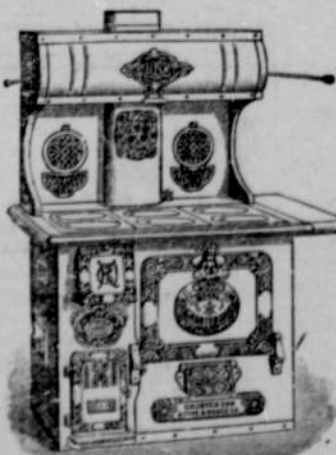
