ter, who said, in the course of his minis-
try, he had seen times when he would
have been glad to have had members in
his church assume and get under a debt
the same as some of the members of the
Presbyterian church of this city had
done. Rev. J. E. Connor, of the U. B.
church, and Rev. C. A. Stockwell, of the
M. E. church, also made appropriate re-
marks, congratulating the Presbyterians
in being free from debt, and in its greater
sphere of usefulness in the future.
