Mr. Rockefeller and His Neckties.

In spite of the fact that John D. Rockefeller has gone on record advising young men not to be good fellows, there is some evidence that he is something of a good fellow himself. A man who can give away more than \$100,000,000 is certainly not a bad sort of fellow, in the sense in which the term "good fellow" is usually employed. The amount he has given away may be roughly approximated as 20 per cent of his total wealth and there are those with assured reputation for good fellowship who have never attained such a high percentage. Such a reputation for liberality has saved Mr. Rockefeller from being laughed at, as it has Mr. Carnegie, and a few other men, all of whom can be counted upon the fingers of one hand. When a private fortune runs far into the millions and the clouds of a rainy day and the shadow of a wolf on the threshold are no longer to be feared, the man who continues saving both at the bung and the spigot becomes something of a joke. There is a consensus of opinion on the line of thinking that such a man is without the sense of humor which so often saves people from becoming ridiculous. The late Mr. Ingersoll gave us a flash-light of the mental operations of such people in saying that we would regard a man with five or six million neckties who should work hard every day for the purpose of getting one necktie more, as being ridiculous, but that the man with five or six million dollars and exerting himself to add another dollar to his possessions, why not less so. For, said he, the man with five or six million neckties has just as much use for another necktie as the man with five or six million dollars has for another dollar.

It is a word of change, and the multi-millionaire who only holds fast and adds may justify himself unto himself with the reflection that money can take unto itself wings and fly away. None the less did the brilliant agnostic express the common thought in saying that one with wealth beyond the dreams of avarice becomes ridiculous through constant addition never varied by subtraction for great and beneficent ends or uses. There may have been a keen perception of this fact, as well as a philanthropic design, in the many and mighty munificences of such men as Rockefeller and Carnegie. They at least have assured for themselves a better place in history than that of any one of a number of dead American millionaires whose millions have since been squandered by lords and dukes of alien soil. The place of Mr. Rockefeller in history as one of the greatest philanthropists of the world is already safe. Posterity can never laugh at him. Yet the suspicion, if not the conviction, that he is being laughed at right now must be very disquieting to a man of his high potency in the world of affairs. Wherever he is, and however impossible he has made it for the officers armed with the subpoena of a court to find him, the consciousness that he is in hiding for the purpose of saving a few dollars, when he has more dollars than he can possibly ever use, must make a man of his discernment writhe. It is not likely that he can see the funny side of his situation. If he could, he would never have placed himself in it. But he is unable to blink the fact that he is suffering a great loss of dignity. And that is a great deal to the possessor of half a billion dollars.

Efforts have been made to trace him by watching the markets where his favorite delicacies are bought, in the hope of following the consignment. It has not appeared to strike anybody that he may have been kidnaped and is being held for ransom. The fact that a court subpoena is out for him, commanding him to appear as a witness in proceedings calculated to compel the Standard Oil company to a conformance with the law in its operations, is universally taken to be the explanation of his sudden and mysterious disappearance. Where at the public laughs. It could find excuse for Rogers, a subordinate of Rockefeller, in his writhing efforts to avoid telling the whole truth and nothing but the truth. But in Rockefeller it sees the supreme head of that great system now under investigation, who can speak with none to molest him or make him afraid, who can tell all the truth, without fear or favor. It understands how the telling might prevent his making some money, but when it thinks of his hundreds of millions already made, and the countless millions which could still be made by legal operations of the plants and wells, it thinks also of Mr. Ingersoll's smiles of the man who, with \$100,000,000 neckties, struggling desperately for another. Talk of contempt of

court is wide of the point. It is not contempt of court to avoid service. Mr. Rockefeller has no contempt for the court. But how does he feel toward himself.—Globe Democrat.

TOOZE MEN ARE CONFIDENT.
Said to Have a Strong Lead in Southern Oregon Counties.

WOODBURN, Ore., Feb. 27.—Walter L. Tooze, candidate for congress in this district, has returned home from a visit in Southern Oregon, where he received many assurances of support. He is strongly in the lead in Southern Oregon, while the coast counties are overwhelmingly for him. I. H. Bingham, of Lane County, who was the most prominent Congressional candidate in the south, has withdrawn from the race, and is a candidate for State Senator.

The Hawley forces in this county show plain evidences of disintegration. Mark Skiff, Marshal Tom Cornelius and several others of Salem who were included in the Hawley list, are supporting Tooze; while Thomas Kay and others, quoted as "united on Hawley," declare such a statement as unauthorized. The straw vote taken at Albany and favoring Huston was doubtless taken among his friends by an avowed Huston man. Friends of Tooze assert that he is leading both Huston and Hawley in Linn County by long odds.

The report that Tooze's own precinct would not support him is like the other reports. He carried Woodburn at the last election by a vote of 200 to 99, and this year the people of Woodburn will stand by their candidate by a larger majority, while Marion County will doubtless roll up a good plurality for him on April 20.

Voters all over the district are turning to the support of Tooze because he is fought by the Salem school land ring and those who have profited by questionable methods in the procurement of our public lands. A strong point being generally advocated by the electors of the district in favor of Tooze's nomination for Congress is his record and services for 20 years in the enunciation of the principles of sound Republicanism, in marked contrast to the well-known and admitted fact that neither Huston or Hawley has ever been actively identified with the republican party until they became candidates for Congress.
