

CITY COUNCIL ACTS.

Appoints a Special Policeman to Enforce the Law.

A meeting of the city council was held Monday evening, with Mayor H. T. Botts and Councilmen J. A. Allen, A. T. White, M. Munson and W. C. King were present.

The report of the street committee that number of new side walks be put in several streets to be graveled was adopted.

Owing to a mistake in the assessment for improvements on Third street, this was cancelled and the recorder was instructed to give notice that another assessment would be made.

Bills allowed were: Recorder's salary, \$15; electric lights, \$40; insurance, \$13.55.

Councilmen Allen and Case resigned as councilmen and their resignations were accepted.

Mayor Botts appointed A. T. Lucy as street commissioner, which was confirmed by the city council, and upon a resolution being introduced, it was decided that Lucy act as special policeman, and as this gives him the same power as the city marshal, the mayor pursued this course in obtaining a peace officer who would live up to his oath of office and enforce the laws.

A petition was read to have the ordinance passed at the last meeting of the city council relating to the licensing and control of pool rooms submitted to a vote of the people was laid over until the next meeting. The petition is defective, and it rests with the city council to call a special election, lay it on the table or hold it over until the annual election.

An ordinance to fix the salary of the city marshal and special policeman went through without opposition. It reduced the salary of the city marshal to \$1 a month and the special policeman was fixed at \$4, who, in addition, is to receive \$40 per month for street commissioner and fire warden, which was embodied in another ordinance. This practically deposes Marshal Eberman and places the peace and preservation of order in the hands of Mayor Botts and the city council, who intend to make it tropical for those who have been violating the law.

The saw mill whistle will be used instead of the fire bell for the curfew alarm in the future.

An ordinance, to regulate pool rooms and to close them up on Sundays, where no charge is made for playing, was read and passed to its final reading. As the ordinance contained the emergency clause this will deprive those who want to make it difficult to maintain order within the city from thwarting the efforts of those who do.

Death of a Former School Teacher.

Mrs. O. M. Varson, nee Alice Vessey, died Monday a.m. at the city hospital. She had been sick at her mother's home in Eldridge for several weeks and was brought to the city hospital Saturday and an operation performed on her Monday in the hopes of saving her life, but in her weak condition she was unable to withstand the operation and died at 8 o'clock Monday morning.

Mrs. Varson taught in the city schools here for two years, and from here she went to Tillamook City, Oregon, where she taught for a year. Last June at Portland, Ore., she was married to O. M. Varson, of Valley City, where she has since made her home. Besides her husband she leaves her mother, father, two sisters, Mrs. W. Ford, of Eldridge, and Miss Ella, who resides at Portland, Ore., and six brothers, Harry, David, Alvin, Glenn, Howard and Cassius who live here in Eldridge.

Mrs. Varson's death is a shock to her many friends here, whose sympathy goes out to the bereaved husband. She was a loving wife, a sincere christian worker, being a member of the Methodist church in this city and president of the Epworth League society of Valley City.

The funeral was held from the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. Anderson, of Valley City, and Rev. C. H. Phillips of this city officiating. Burial was made in the Highland Home cemetery.—North Dakota Capital.

Great Waste of Eggs and Poor Arguments for the Liquor Traffic.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.

The unexpected and pelting shower of eggs received by the undersigned, a pastor of a small, but unpopular church in Tillamook, on last Sabbath evening as he was on his way from church to the bedside of a sick man, who was lying at the point of death, is one of the arguments of the liquor traffic which will cost them doubtless several votes in the next election. Turning a corner, I noticed a company of young men varying in age probably from 15 to 25 years of age lined up on the edge of the walk where I was to pass, near by were several small boys from 10 to 12 years of age, who were in the plot, although I do not think they took an active part in the mob. Just as I passed the young men, while not a word was said, as I approached, the battery of eggs was discharged. At the first volley I immediately turned toward my assailants to demand an explanation of their sneaking, cowardly act; when, to my great surprise the crowd were running as if frightened out of their wits by a little old man nearly 60 years old, climbing fences in their haste to get away. Brave fellows. Surely the saloon should vote them a medal of honor for their courage. Sir, is always cowardly, and the Bible declares "the wicked flee when no man pursueth."

Changing my clothing, I visited at once the saloon that apparently has the greatest patronage in the place and retails only "Temperance Drinks," according to the verdict of some of its patrons. I requested the privilege of the bar keeper for preaching for a few minutes to the audience present in the pool room. This was positively, though courteously refused. This was on Sabbath evening near 10 o'clock and there was a larger audience present than I had preached at the church one hour before.

One old gentleman informed me it would be very much out of place for me to preach there, as the church was built for that purpose, said he was a church member himself, but the odour of bad decomposing whiskey and death that came from his lips, caused his advice to lose its force; young men, some in their teens were too much intoxicated to walk straight, some bore the marks of refinement, one a young farmer, and with naturally a handsome countenance. Judging by his appearance he is already a confirmed drunkard.

One boy present I was informed was the son of a widow. Poor woman, a double sorrow is upon her unless the boy speedily reforms.

In the conversation with the old gentleman a number of young men gathered around us to listen to the conversation. Without telling the occurrence of the evening, I incidentally referred to the difference of receiving raw eggs and boiled ones, when, I think without an exception, everyone of the listening young men broke into a loud and boisterous laugh, showing that my relations to the logic of raw eggs was clearly understood by those present, and proving just what I wanted to prove that the lawlessness of this town is clearly the product of the saloon. If I may speak for law order and respectability and as an attraction to others that would like to live in Tillamook, I appeal to voters to elect officers that will enforce law and order and protect its citizens.

Sheriff of Tillamook County and Marshal of Tillamook is their not a case here that you are in duty bound to look into and bring the perpetrators to justice? What right have these bums and hoodlums and rowdies to attack a peaceful citizen of this town in such a cowardly manner and way and not be amenable to the law for it? I tell you do your duty in this case though the heavens fall. You can find out who did it and it won't be hard matter, and it is your duty to do it. It will be a splendid thing to teach them that that kind of business won't be tolerated in any civilized community. If you neither one will look into this matter then it is high time that the Church and moral element form a "Whitecap" society and enforce law in the primitive method of the old-time vigilance committee. Let's enforce the laws and keep hell from breaking loose.
