Every little Shylock pup, of course, is barking loudest just now and scrambling for a front seat in the Shylock political band wagon, and every teat puller is invited into the crowd so that the Shylocks and their pups can milk them.

Good! The new city peace officer no sooner got into harness when he commenced cleaning up the city. The long, drawn out agitation for a bridge across the south fork of the Nehalem river and the Nestucca river is a thing of the past, for contracts were let on Thursday to construct those bridges. The board of county commissioners must be congratulated, as well as the people who will be benefited by these long desired improvements. The bridges should have been built years ago, but better late than never. The danger of fording these rivers in winter have caused some narrow escapes from drowning, and now this will be avoided in the future, the money that will be expended is wisely spent, if for no other reason than the protection of life. It is another step towards the development of the county, and as to the cost, everybody must admit that the cost is getting the bridges built at low figures.

Every respectable, law abiding citizen should endorse Mayor Botts' action on Monday evening when he appointed A. T. Lucy street commissioner, and who is to act as special policeman. The trouble with Tillamook City is that quite a few of our citizens do not want to make the city decent and respectable, and whenever there is any rowdyism and violation of the law going on, they are always to be found on the side of the toughs. It is to the interest of every business man to assist Mayor Botts and the city council in their efforts to make Tillamook City a respectable, decent city, where people can come and trade without being annoyed. Should the newly appointed policeman fail to enforce the law, then the city council will have to cut him off at the pockets and employ somebody who will. It is about time Tillamook City had a city marshal who will enforce the law, and we sincerely trust, for the best interest of the city, that Lucy will fill the bill. He has promised Mayor Botts that he will enforce the law. We hope he will prove himself to be a man of his word and live up to his oath of office.

TO BE "BOTTLED UP" OR "OPENED UP."

A Proposition to Submit the Toll Road Question to a Vote of the People.

Surely Tillamook County has outgrown toll roads.

Do you want the county court to bottle up the county with toll roads for another five years?

The county leased the Wilson river road for 50 years. And what did the people get for it? Why, they are getting it in the neck now.

Cut out the toll road "graft." Why allow a county court to lease a toll road for fifty years so that the democratic "push" could re-lease it and put about 40 per cent of the gate money down in their jeans?

The people of Tillamook county are getting their eyes open. What do they think of a county court that will lease a county road for fifty years without first ascertaining the sentiment of the people or even giving notice that it was going to lease it.

It would have looked more just and proper, instead of the board of county commissioners calling for bids for the lease of the Nestucca toll roads, had it called for an election on the question at the primary or general election. Let the people decide for themselves, for they have a right to be heard and should demand a voice in the matter.

Take a vote on the toll road question so that the people can have something to say about it. The Headlight man believes it should be submitted to a popular vote. That will throw the responsibility on the people, and will relieve a good many political candidates who are a little timid in taking the stand the Headlight has against toll roads.

It was decided at the meeting of the board of commissioners on Thursday to call for bids to lease the Nestucca toll roads for five years, the bids to be in by the next term of the court in May. It seems to us that it will be poor judgment for the present court to lease the roads for five years without giving the people an opportunity to vote on the question, as there is considerable feeling against re-leasing the roads. In our judgment it should be the people and not the court who should decide this question, and to bring this about if County Judge Conder and Commissioners Bodyfelt and Loerpabel will arrange for a separate vote to be taken at the primary election the Headlight man will print the ballots free of cost to the county so as to ascertain the exact sentiment of the people. If the court is unwilling to take up this fair, open proposition it ought not to lease the roads for five years on the eve of going out of office.

Suppose the county is able to lease the Nestucca toll roads for \$1500 a year, the bad reputation the county gets by doing so makes it a detriment to the progress and development of the county. For instance, there is very little increase in the population the past seven years. Why not, then, get out of the old, worn out toll roads and make a new move to increase the population? Everybody can see that the toll roads are not increasing the population. In the name of common sense, seeing that toll roads have been in existence for so many years, it ought to appeal to every fair minded person to give the free roads a trial so as to increase the population. It is population that Tillamook is in need of, not toll gates to shut people out and drive them away. Give the free roads a trial, anyway. We fail to see what good and what benefit the toll roads have been to the county, and it is surprising to us that some people take such a narrow view of bottling the county up in that manner.

Agent to Run Fairview Factory.

Mr. C. L. Roper, representing John B. Agen, who is the owner of the Fairview creamery, has decided to run that factory this season. The dairymen of Fairview had agreed to buy the factory, but this seems to have miscarried. Mr. Roper has a letter from Mr. Agen in which the latter agrees to pay the patrons twice a month for their milk.

To the Dairymen and Patrons of the Fairview Creamery. GENTLEMEN.—We are about to open the Fairview Creamery and are going to adopt a new system of paying for the milk in Tillamook County, namely, to pay the patrons twice a month for their milk, on the 10th and the 25th, or, in other words milk that is received up to and including the 15th of the month will be paid for on the 25th of the same month; milk received from the 16th to the 1st will be paid for on the 10th of the following month. In this way you will not be kept out of your money anywhere from two to three months as has usually been the case in your county. And not only that but will say that we will pay you as much or more for your product during the year round than any individual or co-operative creamery or cheese factory.

You know we have our own stores in Seattle, Tacoma and Bellingham, besides our Northern business, and we will not only handle all of the cheese we manufacture ourselves, but will be large purchasers of cheese besides. This insures you quick returns on your milk and a good market. Hoping that we may have your patronage, and assuring you that we will treat you right.
