The passengers who went out on the Sue H. Elmore on Tuesday were Mrs. S. F. Tompkins, J. W. Tompkins, Mrs. and Miss Illingsworth, Wm. Illingsworth, H. Goulstrom, Mrs. and Allen Page, C. Goynne and Mrs. B. C. Lamb and son.

The dairymen at Fairview does not take kindly to the proposition of Mr. Agen to run the factory there. What the outcome will be it is hard to tell, as quite a few of the dairymen are of the opinion that it is to their interest to either buy or build.

Louis R. Nelson, brother of Charles and Merle Nelson, of Cloverdale, died from typhoid fever at Eugene on Monday, and they left, with their sister, to attend the funeral at McMinnville. Deceased was 25 years of age and died after several weeks of illness.

A divorce suit was filed in the circuit court by Maurice W. Northrup against his wife, Mrs. Rosa P. Northrup, and in the complaint the cause is stated to be set forth to dissolve the tie that binds them. These parties were married at Hillsboro and as a result of the union three children were born. T. H. Goynne is the attorney for plaintiff.

John Simmons, of this county, was badly injured on Thursday while working at the Carlton Lumber Company's camp, 14 miles from Carlton. A hook on the tender cable slipped, knocking him down and a log was drawn over him. He was taken to the hospital at Carlton and there were slight hopes of recovery. So badly was Simmons injured that the doctors thought he could only live a few hours. The log had mashed his left side, broken his arm and he was throwing up blood. Next morning, to the surprise of the doctors, Simmons began to rally, when they set the broken arm and dressed his injuries, and in all probability he will pull through and be up in a day or so. On hearing of the accident Mrs. Simmons left immediately for Carlton.

The Washington county court, at its meeting last week, leased the section of the Wilson River road in the county between Gales Creek and the Tillamook county line to John McNamer, to be operated as a toll road in accordance with the state law. The Forest Grove Times says there has been considerable feeling in that city in regard to the matter, and a protest had been signed by a good many interested parties, but the court thought the arguments for a toll road were stronger than the reasons against it and accordingly made the lease. The Headlight has been informed that it is only a conditional lease, that if Tillamook County leases the Wilson river road for a toll road, Washington county is going to do the same thing, thereby making a double toll for the people to pay to get into Tillamook county over that road. Another question is now being inquired into, Can the counties bottle up government land with the toll gates?

Death Claims Three Persons.

WILLIAM MASON TOMPKINS. We regret to announce the death, last Sunday morning, of Grandpa Tompkins, after a long and tedious illness. The deceased, Wm. J. Tompkins, was born in Green Co., Ill., and was 78 years, nine months and four days old. He has lived in Tillamook about six years, coming from Forest Grove. He has been very feeble since two years ago, when he had a severe illness, and has been slowly wasting away with consumption. He leaves a widow and six children to deplore the loss of a kind and affectionate husband and father, and hosts of friends to whom he will always be a pleasant memory. All that care and attention, time and money, could do to alleviate his sufferings and make his last days peaceful, was done by his devoted family.

William Mason Tompkins, who died at his home on Big Nestucca on Sunday, was born June 6th, 1827, in Green Co., Ill. He crossed the plains in 1852 and settled in Washington county, where he resided until February, 1899, when he came to Tillamook. He married Sarah J. Ledford (nee Walker) in September, 1863, at Hillsboro, Ore. He leaves a widow and six children to mourn his death, viz., Mrs. George Bacon and Mrs. C. F. Miller, of Forest Grove, Cr.; J. W. Thompson (with whom he resided) and Mrs. N. J. Myers, of Tillamook; Mrs. Denver, who lives near Astoria; and Robert J. Tompkins, of Gaston, Or. It was the desire of the deceased that he should be buried at Forest Grove, and the remains were taken out on the Sue H. Elmore on Tuesday.

MRS. NETTIE STEPHENS. It is with much regret that we have to announce the death of Mrs. Nettie Stephens, wife of W. J. Stephens, which occurred in San Francisco on Saturday night, but it was Wednesday morning before the sad news was received in this city on account of the wires being down. Her husband left last week to bring Mrs. Stephens home, and was timed to reach San Francisco on Saturday morning. She left here several months ago for California for the benefit of her health. At first she improved some, but as the consumption had taken a strong hold on her she gradually grew worse until a few weeks ago, when she rapidly declined until the end came on Saturday and relieved her of her suffering, the grim reaper claiming another young Tillamook woman who was beloved and respected by a large number of friends. Mr. Stephens left Sheridan this morning with the remains, and will probably arrive in this city to-morrow.

MRS. LIZZIE BODYFELT. Another young woman to meet an untimely death on Sunday was Mrs. Lizzie Bodyfelt, wife of James Bodyfelt, who resides in the south part of the county. Deceased was a daughter of Mr. L. Fleck, and was a young woman who was respected and loved in the neighborhood in which she lived, especially by the young people. Sad to relate, she leaves two small children and a husband to mourn their loss. The remains were buried on Monday by the Rebecca lodge, of which deceased was a member, and which was attended by a large number of sympathetic friends.

Information About Road Making. County Judge W. W. Conder received the following letter from Senator C. W. Fulton in regard to building good roads: MY DEAR SIR,—I have mailed to your address a package of pamphlets, which were issued by the Goods Roads Bureau of our Government, on the subject of road building. Neither "Earth Roads" nor Good Roads for Farmers is a recent publication, but each contains valuable information on road construction, which I thought would perhaps interest some of your prominent citizens. The Agricultural Department has promised me to issue another circular soon, devoted to road-making and conditions of the Northwest, which I hope will be out in time for distribution prior to the demonstrative work that is to be done at Pendleton and Salem this Spring. I will be pleased to put as many of these in circulation throughout your county as possible, that we may intensify the good roads movement in every way possible.

All money paid for the lease of said roads will be expended on the two Toll Roads each year under the supervision of the County Court.
