H. M. CAKE FOR SENATOR

Is the Leading Candidate with a Host of Staunch Friends Supporting Him.

Of all the aspirants for United States Senator, Mr. H. M. Cake, of Portland, is certainly the most fitted to represent Oregon in the national assembly, and the people of the state will not be making a mistake when they cast their vote for him at the primary election, for there is no doubt whatever but that he is energetic and wide-awake to the interests of Oregon. For the past six years he has been prominently identified, as president of the Portland Commercial Club, with a good deal of the progress and development of Oregon, and coming in touch with people from all parts of the state he is conversant with the needs of the state. Mr. Cake is the kind of man Oregon needs in the United States senate, for he knows the needs of Oregon, and from present indications it looks as though he will be the next U. S. senator. That appears to be almost conceded, for Mr. Cake has a large personal following, and no sooner had he announced himself that he would be a candidate, when his many friends rallied around and have pledged him their loyal support.

In regard to his candidacy and what he stands for Mr. Cake has this to say: I believe the public service corporations should be subject to governmental regulation and control. The power of regulation should be vested in the Interstate Commerce Commission, and should be exercised with due regard to the respective rights of the people and the corporations.

Trusts or combinations of capital organized for the purpose of controlling the utilities and necessities of the country to the exclusion of legitimate competition, are contrary to public policy; in derogation to the rights of the people, and should come under the bar of the law.

I believe in preserving the dignity of our American citizenship, and the freedom of the laboring classes of this country, and hence I am opposed to the admission of the coolie labor of China, and the undesirable classes of Continental Europe.

The growing commerce of Oregon demands the deepening of the bar of the Columbia River, the construction of the Dalles Cello Canal; the improvement of the upper Columbia; the improvement of Coos Bay, Tillamook and Yaquina harbors; the dredging of the upper Willamette and the Government ownership of the Locks at Oregon City, and Federal appropriations should be made securing these improvements.

A tariff should be maintained for the protection of American industries and American labor. Where, however, the necessity for protection is removed by the growth and development of a particular industry, the tariff should be modified to meet the changed conditions.

The reclamation of the arid lands is one of the pressing needs of the Northwest, and a condition to its greater development, and the efficiency of the reclamation service should be one of the first cares of the Federal Government.

The Federal Constitution should be amended to provide for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

I am in favor of the establishment of the parcel post.

Favorite of the People.

The old Salem ring politicians don't take kindly to Walter L. Toozé of Woodburn for congress. He is a little too active and energetic for them. He is too independent to suit them.

He has all the energy and strenuousness of Roosevelt, keeps his ear as close to the ground as McKinley.

He wrote a platform that was a surprise to the ring leaders. It struck out boldly on new lines, and all they could do was to copy it.

If Walter L. Toozé is nominated he will not have to give all the fat places to two generations of old political hacks.

He will not be mortgaged up to the neck financially for money advanced to him by bosses who will dictate his appointments.

The producers and the laboring men and the real workers in the Republican party will have something to say as well as the fellows who have won out official chair bottoms and had their pictures painted at public expense.

Lytle Buys Stock Yards.

E. E. Lytle, president of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, Saturday purchased the stock yards of the Portland Union Stock Yards Company, located in North Portland, northwest of the Union depot. The transaction was made through the realty firm of Grindstaff & Schalk, and although the exact consideration has not been made public, it is understood to be in excess of \$185,000, and may be considerably in advance of that figure.

It is understood that a portion of the ground covered by the stock yards will be devoted to warehouse purposes, and it is expected that there will be constructed upon it a number of the most commodious warehouse buildings in the city. It is believed that the remainder of the tract will be used as terminals for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, of which the purchaser is the chief executive. The land is admirably situated for terminal property, and so far as known the company has made no other purchases of land in Portland. The general terminals of the company will doubtless be at Hillboro where the road connects with the tracks of the Southern Pacific, but as it is supposed the trains of the company will be sent to Portland over the tracks of the Southern Pacific, terminal properties will be indispensable in that city.

Lincoln County Feels Satisfied.

There was something doing in Toledo the fore part of the week—in fact, there is still something doing. After a month's mixup with rumor, pessimism and doubt, the situation is cleared and our citizens are lined up in support of the Oregon Coast and Eastern railway proposition.

Thomas Leese, president of the Lincoln County Bank, has been very active and persistent in securing satisfactory evidence of the genuineness of the project and the financial responsibility of its promoters. He laid the result of his investigation before the people, placed upon it the seal of his approval and started the work of organizing for a united effort in securing a right-of-way for a railroad through Lincoln county north and south.

Three citizens' meetings—the third held Wednesday evening—resulted in the organization of the Lincoln County Right of Way Company, with William Scarth, J. F. Stewart and C. H. Gardner as incorporators.

A board of directors was elected consisting of William Scarth, M. N. Anderson, Lee Wate, A. F. Peterson, J. F. Stewart, C. E. Hawkins and Otto O. Krogstad. The directors held a meeting and elected the following officers for the ensuing year: William Scarth, president; Otto O. Krogstad, secretary; C. E. Hawkins, treasurer.

The capital stock of the company was fixed at \$5000, the major part of which was soon subscribed, Messrs Leese & Scarth of the local bank heading the list with \$500.

Following is a copy of the agreement to be entered into by parties granting right of way with the promoters of the road.

"Gentlemen: Referring to your request for right of way through our lands in Lincoln county, Oregon, for your projected railway:

We will give such necessary right of way, and permit entry for construction purposes, when we are satisfied that you have the project fully financed.

Conveyances will be made to you or your assigns when construction begins on our lands, same to be placed in escrow with the Security Savings & Trust Company of Portland, Oregon, to be delivered when the grade is completed.

Unless you begin the work of permanent surveys and grading on the system within six months, this agreement is to be void and of no effect."
