Editorial Snap Shots.

Watch Tillamook Grow! When the toll roads are given a decent, respectable burial.

Henry Leach says that the latest addition last week to his family is not aspiring to the office of sheriff, but will do for the deputy.

We're awfully pleased we haven't got that troublesome malady that gets right down into the marrow bones of so many men whenever there is an election a few months ahead.

We are reliably informed that if H. F. Goodspeed lands the nomination, as it is about conceded that he will do so, quite a number of democrats have openly said they are going to vote for him.

We cannot see for the life of us what claim Jonathan Bourne, jr., has upon the people of Oregon that they should vote or him for United States senator, other than that he has shaved off his whiskers and made a bouquet for his coat of the sandy sideburns.

Should the county get a verdict in the case against the bondsmen of the late Henry Alderman, in which they are sued for about \$8,000, the county will only get 60 per cent of it and the law firm of Handley & Thayer will get the other 40 per cent, or, in other words, the county will have to pay \$3,200 out of the shortage for legal work that should not have cost the county one cent.

In the last report of the postmaster general is this strong incidental argument for good roads: "The requirement precedent to the establishment of rural delivery shall be a possible patronage of 100 families on a standard route of twenty-four miles; that the roads be kept in good condition, unobstructed by gates, and with all streams fordable at all seasons of the year." The world is getting to be a poor place for neighborhoods with mud-hole roads.

No one can or ought to feel sore nor is there any reason why they should become disgruntled. The primary nominating law gives everybody an equal right to announce themselves an aspirant for any office they may wish to run for, and as to getting on the official ballot, that is as easy as falling off a log. So there ought not to be any complaint along that line, and if there is, it will be by those who are afraid to have their names placed upon the official ballot for the people to vote on. The primary law will show how high or how low a number of men stand in the public estimation.

Now that the matter is fully explained no one can blame the Washington county officials for making a conditional lease of a part of the Wilson river road in that county. Commissioner Buchanan says "when Tillamook pulls the cork on their end, the cork on the Washington county end will pop out of its own accord." Or, in other words, if Tillamook corks itself up with toll roads, Washington county is going to bug in another cork so as to make the "hottled up" process complete and so as to get some of the money that people are held up for who want to get in or out of Tillamook over the Wilson river road.

Another democratic war horse is liable to bob up at any time, for word was brought to us a day or go ago that John D. Edwards has a political bee buzzing in his bonnet and that he is anxious to get into the race for county judge. It is quite natural that John should feel that way and we must sympathize with him. We helped to put him into the political cold storage some few years ago, and we are surprised the Unterrified John has thawed out so quickly. As it is a free, open race for everybody, John is invited back to Tillamook to take another whack at getting into public office or going into political cold storage again.

There is nothing small about Tillamook—only its population. For instance, one cheese factory, the Maple Creamery, in a week or so will be receiving 20,000 pounds of milk daily and will manufacture thirty one tons of cheese a month. Without in any way over estimating the product, should the factories confine themselves this year to cheese as they did last year, three million pounds of cheese will be the output for Tillamook in 1906, with the average price of butter fat somewhere near 25c. to 28c. per lb. Thus everything looks bright and prosperous for the dairymen in Tillamook, yet it is surprising that so few new sets there come to Tillamook and participate in this prosperous industry.

"Get Busy!" is what the Hoyt Boosters are advising. Ralph W. Hoyt is a candidate for state treasurer, and his numerous friends from now on will be active and intend to make it tropical and interesting from now on. Not only will Mr. Hoyt get a big support in Multnomah county, but he is liable to encroach upon the territory of the other aspirants. Mr. Hoyt made a good county treasurer when he held Multnomah's sack, and is well qualified to hold the State's sack in safety and leave just as good record behind him as he did when he stepped down and out from being county treasurer. The advent of Mr. Hoyt into the race will put all the other aspirants on the jump, for Ralph is a hustler whenever he is after anything.

No one has ever questioned the republicanism of Mr. H. M. Cake, candidate for United States Senate, for he has never swerved from the fixed and established principles of his party, and during his entire career in the State of Oregon, he has always been found upon the right side of every public question. Mr. Cake has done everything in his power to preserve harmony in the party, and one of his greatest ambitions is to see that party united for the common good of the State. The people are tired of factional fights, says Mr. Cake, "and should be free to express their principles at the polls, independent of the domination of machine rules." He went to the senate and while there nominated Judge A. S. Bennett for united state senator, in one of the strongest free silver speeches ever heard. In 1900 Huston was on a free silver democratic ticket, declaring openly that he would support John H. Mitchell and none other for senator. But when the presidential election came around he flopped over and canvassed for McKinley. This is the record the Enterprise would have you believe fits a man for the congressional representation of Oregon. But what does this record look like when you compare it with the 20 years' service of Hon. W. L. Tooez, of Woodburn? Mr. Tooez has been identified with the republican party for a life time. He came out boldly against free silver during that memorable crisis and stood firmly for republican principles. Is not this record a stronger argument for congressional honors than the vacillating career of flopping from populism? A vote for Tooez means a deserved recognition of a life work for the republican party.—Polk County Itemizer.
