**Death of W. H. H. Cary.**

W. H. H. Cary, who has been failing in health for several months, was taken worse the first part of the week, and his son, W. H. Cary, who is now in the lighthouse service, was sent for, but before he could reach this city, Mr. Cary passed away, for he died on Wednesday evening. Deceased was born in Indiana in 1839, which would have made him 67 years of age in June. He went from Indiana to Placerville, Cal., in 1845, and from there he went to Carson City, where he resided for 28 years, and then came to Oregon in 1884. He served as county commissioner for Tillamook when he resided at Dolph. Deceased was married in Michigan in 1864 to Miss Feby Swaine and had four children, two of whom survive, viz., Mr. C. H. Woolfe and W. H. Cary. His wife died at Dolph in 1892 and was buried at Willamina, where the remains of deceased will be taken on Friday for burial. Deceased had been a member of the Oddfellow fraternity for over 40 years, and was a charter member of the Nestucca lodge. In the death of Mr. Cary another conspicuous citizen of this county passes away from the scene to the great beyond.

**The Bar's Sympathy.**

To the Honorable Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Tillamook County. William Galloway, Judge, Presiding. Your committee appointed to prepare and move resolutions agent the death of Honorable Thomas Bishop Handley, does hereby report to you the following resolutions and recommend their adoption:

Whereas, Thomas Bishop Handley was for over 20 years a member of the bar of the State of Oregon; and, whereas; said Thomas Bishop Handley died at Tillamook, Oregon, on the 12th day of Dec. 1905; now, therefore, be it resolved by the members of the Oregon Bar assembled at Tillamook Oregon, Honorable Wm. Galloway presiding, that the members of this circuit, particularly, and the entire bar of the State of Oregon, have suffered an irreparable loss by the death of Mr. Handley; that during a long and active life Mr. Handley proved himself to be a man of high professional honor, superb mental attainments, and a lawyer of wide and acute perception of the law in the broadest and deepest features; that, as a member of the bar of Oregon during the early formative period, his intrinsic worth, his solid grasp of legal principles, coupled with his wisdom and industry, materially and in a most beneficial way helped to found and build the legal edifice of which the State of Oregon is to-day proud; that, as a citizen, he assisted in the establishment of many schools, public enterprises, and in all ways performed the duties of a good citizen; that to the memory of Thomas Bishop Handley we do hereby tender this inadequate, although sincere, tribute, testifying the high esteem in which we held our lost brother, both in professional ways, and in the social walks of life; that to the beloved wife and family of Mr. Handley, his fellow lawyers extend their commiseration at the loss of companion, a guardian and a friend whose loss no human aid or words can assuage; that these resolutions be spread upon the records of this court and copies thereof be to the clerk furnished to the newspapers of this county, the Oregonian, and to the family of Mr. Handley.

And that this Court stand adjourned for a due time in honor to Mr. Handley's memory.
