Editorial Snap Shots.

It is plain to see that the farmers want a farmer for county judge.

For the second time J. J. Houser came near landing the nomination for joint representative. Perseverance is a good thing.

Most everybody worked for friends in the primary election. That was right and proper. Now let them all work for the republican ticket. That is right and proper, too.

No one need be surprised that the cases in which the late Sheriff H. H. Alderman's shortage are involved are held over for another term of court. A lot of kids could not make a bigger muddle.

Perhaps some of the defeated aspirants feel as though political promises are like soap air balls. But there is this consolation, if it can be called consolation, it can be figured out how much each vote cost.

People generally are well pleased with the result of the primary election. It is to be seen whether the election will proceed smoothly, as it should do, or whether the chronic knocker will still be on the war path.

There is no doubt whatever, in the minds of a large number of people, that Goodspeed will be the next county judge and Crenshaw the next sheriff, for both will draw a large number of democratic votes in June.

To be defeated at a primary election, and a little thing like that, should not make any of the unlucky aspirants feel as though they had been covered up by a big avalanche. There's scores of better things to strive after, than public office.

The nomination of Dr. James Withycombe for governor on the republican ticket is the best thing for the party, for had Geer become the nominee more or less friction would have cropped out in the campaign. Dr. Withycombe is a clean, conservative, capable man, and his nomination will help to unite the party more than any other aspirant, for there is no reason why he should not receive the entire support of his party.

Perhaps of all the aspirants, none of them jumped from what was thought to be the lowest place and landed the nomination on the home stretch in the last few days as George W. Bodyfelt for commissioner. He came out squarely to have the toll road question submitted to the people. That settled it, and a genuine stampede resulted in his favor. George must be getting quite a politician to hold a trump card up his sleeve so long and then play it with so much success at the last moment.

It will soon dawn upon the voters that the direct primary law is not what it is cracked up to be, for in the five corner race for United States senator, everybody can now plainly see that with the vote so split up amongst all the aspirants, the one with the big sack who can do the most advertising and can send out the most literature stands the best show. A person with a limited amount of capital cannot hope to succeed with a person with unlimited means when there are so many aspirants for senator.

The terrible calamity in San Francisco and California last week did so much damage and caused so much loss of life that it will be hard to estimate the loss. It is gratifying to know, however, that the whole country spontaneously and immediately responded to the call for help, for soon after the earthquake, and while fire was sweeping through several sections of San Francisco, thousands of persons were exerting their energies to send relief to the unfortunate and distressed.

The great burden of those who want to have the Nestucca toll roads leased is where is the county going to get the few hundred dollars to keep them in repair every year. When Judge Conder wanted \$1,500 of the taxpayers' money to buy the Nestucca toll mud holes, not a word of complaint did he then make as to where the money was coming from to buy them. The logic of the whole thing

is this, if there is not enough taxable property in the neighborhood to keep the toll roads up, then there was not enough to buy them. Why not apply the same argument to both cases?

Rollie R. Watson during the past few weeks has published several false statements regarding the Headlight man. We now challenge him to prove wherein we were kept, and who it was that kept us, from "roasting" some of the aspirants. His statements are false, for we never have nor ever intend to allow anyone to run us. We could have published quite a number of items, some of them of a damaging character, that were brought to us for publication, but having adopted a line of action, no one was successful in making us deviate, not even the repeated attempts of Rollie W. Watson to start a factional fight in the interest of his pet candidate.

It was the people's convention on Friday and all who wished had an opportunity to participate. Under the new system there was no packing primaries and conventions, nor trading, as in previous years, thus knocking out the hoodlums who could buy up delegates. Those who will not abide by the result of the people's choice of candidates, are not in favor of this democratic way of making nominations. The election in June will decide whether each party will stand by the candidates that were nominated on Friday. We see no reason why there should be any dissatisfaction in either party, for having nominated their tickets those who helped do so should stay with their party.

We regret that Walter L. Tooze did not obtain the nomination for congress man in the first district. Having worked energetically for the republican party in this district for the past 20 years, he certainly was deserving of better treatment at the hands of the republican party and it was poor gratitude on the part of the republicans of the district to go against a man who has been so loyal and true to the party. If we may be allowed to express an opinion, we hope the republicans of the first district will remove the injustice they did Mr. Tooze on Friday at some future date.
